

FINANCIAL CRISIS HOW IT WAS MET

J. W. Flavelle Gives Interesting Address at Canadian Club.

LLOYD GEORGE PRAISED

"Business Must Go on—British Ships Must Sail.

J. W. Flavelle addressed the members of the Canadian Club at their luncheon yesterday.

Mr. Flavelle reviewed the circumstances leading up to the financial crisis and presented the facts which culminated in the closing of the stock exchanges.

Became unbecomingly. "The man on the street gave evidence that he was uncomfortable," he said, "in speaking of the long lines of people going into the banks."

Responded promptly. "Lloyd George responded promptly. He granted an extension of the bank holiday."

Referring to the insurance risks and the manner in which they were arranged, the speaker observed "That was a stroke of genius."

"Did any of you happen to see the line of people in front of the Bank of England?" asked the chancellor.

"Every obstacle removed." said Mr. Flavelle, "and this final act has placed not only Great Britain but all the world under a great obligation."

In regard to the conditions in Canada the speaker said a great deal of confusion seemed to exist.

The condition existing in Manitoba was reviewed. "How can that province expect to borrow \$2,000,000 when she has passed a law whereby due dates are postponed for a period?"

Incorporation papers have been taken out by the American Aid Society, which have established their headquarters at the King Edward Hotel.

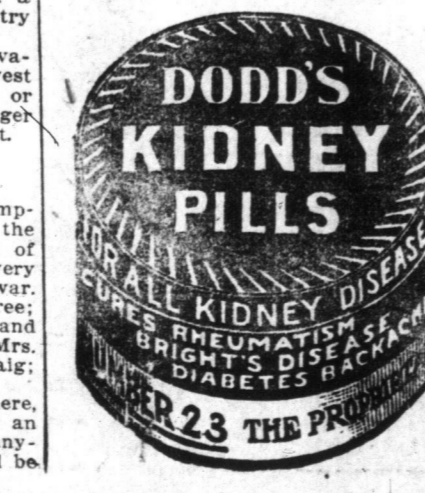
