THE MONEY MARKET.

Canadian money markets have been quiete- this week owing to holiday festivities, but there has still been a fair volume of business done. Money is being invested in popular stocks of all kinds especially industrials by small investors who are looking for interest rather than speculative gains. As far as the local situation is concerned the week has been a quiet one. Banks are not encouraging new business to any extent and are holding a tight remupon their funds. The bank rate remains at from 6 to 8 per cent, according to security, the former figure being only obtainable by gift-edged paper. Loan companies are asking from 6 to 7 per cent for city property toans and 7 to 8 per cent, for farm loans. farm loans.

FINANCIAL NOTES.

The deposits subject to demand amount to \$107,825,635 and on notice \$186,520,765, both of which items increased during the month and also as compared with the previous years. They also hold \$21,222,627 of funds deposited by persons outside of Canada. The largest item of assets is current loans due in Canada, which amounts to \$276,444,126 or over half the assets Cail loans total over \$64,000,000 and current loans out of Canada over \$19,600.

Manitoba Wheat Stocks.
