## FINE INTELLIGENCE OF THE ELEPHANT.

It appears from trustworthy anecdotes that the Asiatic elephants in a few months of captivity acquire the rules of conduct which it is necessary to impose upon them. The speediness of this intellectual acquisition may be judged from the fact that, after a short term of domestication, they will take a willing and intelligent part in capturing their kindred of the wilderness, showing in this work little or no disposition to rejoice in the wild herds. In the case of no other animal do we find anything like such an immediate adhesion to the ways of civilization. We have to account for this eminent peculiarity of the elephant on the supposition, which appears to be thoroughly justified, that the creature has, even in its wild state, a type of intelligence and instincts more nearly like those of men than in the case with any other wild mammal, affinity with human quality which is, perhaps, only approached by certain species of birds. It appears from the observations of naturalists that the family or tribe of wild elephants is a distinct and highly sympathetic community. Scribner.

## DEBS MAY WEAR STRIPES.

### The U. S. Government Takes Action Against Him.

#### THE RAGGED EDGE OF ANARCHY

The Public Warned to Keep Out of the Way of the Military—Strikers Murder a Soldier—Mob Threatens the Torch—The Regulars Will Not Be Trifled With.

Chicago, July 5.—At a late hour last night reports from the various points contiguous to Chicago, where rioting had been going on, indicated that the mob had quieted down. The only point at which danger is feared is at 51st street, where a sullen mob is considering the advisability of burning the Rock Island's yard and passenger coaches.

The Baltimore & Ohio is running its passenger trains on time. In the west, the Santa Fe is gaining ground. No freight was shipped on the Nickel Plate yesterday, but the passenger service was handled in fairly good shape. The Chicago & Grand Trunk started this morning's mail for the east on time.

#### DEBS TO BE PUNISHED.

Not a single excursion was taken out of Chicago yesterday. An official of the Missouri road sent a scout to report that the newspapers warn all law-abiding citizens as well as law-breakers to keep as far away from the troops as possible. The rapidity of the mob and the range of the weapons are such that great loss of life must follow if they fire. The military is not performing its present duties for display or for picnic purposes, but is under orders of the President. It does not propose to allow itself to be besieged or to stand too much nonsense.

The General at once assumed command of the troops. Edwin Walker, special counsel for the Government, yesterday said: "Every man who has trampled on the law will be punished. I do not care anything for the lawbreaker who has been arrested. It is the instigator of the lawlessness that the Government wants to punish. That is Debs. We shall have Debs. We have the evidence against him now, and he will be punished."

#### CLEARING A YARD.

Bloomington, Ill., July 5.—At 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon Marshal Brinton and his deputies assumed control of the railroad yards here, and pickets were placed throughout. At five o'clock the first train, a passenger and mail, for Chicago, pulled out without delay. The mob, who had been waiting for the train, were driven off by the police. The clearing of the yard was completed by 10 o'clock.

#### STRIKERS MURDER A SOLDIER.

Salt Lake City, Utah, July 5.—Five companies of United States troops were ordered to Ogden last evening. Serious trouble is anticipated. Wm. Thornton, Company B, United States Infantry, at Fort Douglas, was stabbed on the street last night and died a few minutes afterwards. The assassin was arrested.

#### OFFICIALS AS FIREMEN.

Milwaukee, Wis., July 5.—The firemen, trainmen and switchmen of the St. Paul railroad went out yesterday. The officials of the road are firing up the trains. A passenger train on the North-western road ran regularly yesterday.

## STARTLING EFFECT OF A STORM.

An Island Moves Half a Mile in Stony Lake, Near Peterboro.

Peterboro, July 5.—The miniature cyclone which passed over this section yesterday had a most singular and startling effect on the contents of the three islands in the channel of Stony Lake, about a half mile from Lakefield. Shortly after the storm had subsided the island was observed by the villagers to be slowly but steadily moving toward the shore with the current, and to the astonishment of all it presently moored itself about forty or fifty yards from the wharf, directly opposite the Tremont House.

The island has always heretofore been regarded as a fixture, and is composed of seemingly solid ground, on which is a luxuriant growth of grass. No one can understand or attempt to explain the phenomenon, though the internal arrangements of the island must have been out of gear for some time, as lately waterpots have been noticed rising from it to quite a considerable height in the air.

Mr. Bowman, of the Tremont, has an idea of fixing the island up for campers, but until there is some assurance of its remaining where it now is, it will hardly be occupied by any tenants.

The sloop Gazette, with a party of New York business men on board, was captured during a squall in Hog Island Inlet, East Rockaway, yesterday afternoon, and John and Charles Maurer and John Smith were drowned.

## THE PLAGUE IN RUSSIA.

St. Petersburg, July 5.—An official inquiry has been made into the character of the fatal disease which is widely prevalent in the province of Radom, numerous cases of which have also made their appearance in St. Petersburg, Moscow and other places. The physicians report that the disease has a strong resemblance to the plague which has prevailed in Hong Kong.

## A MOB SEIZES A TRAIN.

Little Rock, Ark., July 5.—The Texas express on the Iron Mountain Railroad which left here last night was seized by a mob of strikers. The locomotive derailed. A mob of strikers at 12:30 took possession of the Little Rock and Memphis passenger train and refused to allow it to proceed. The Fishback has been asked to call out troops.

### A Member May Deal in Government Contracts.

#### AMYOT THE BRUSH ARTIST.

Ottawa, Ont., July 5.—At a meeting of the Privileges and Elections Committee to-day J. A. Charlebois, Notary, Quebec, was examined and testified to the correctness of a document purporting to be a deed of sale of the contract for marine supplies from Mr. Prevost to Mr. Larose. This was in the case against A. J. Turcotte, M. P.
