Ships fend it over here to England to purchale Goods, which at the Return of the Shipping, they find has turned to much more Advantage than they could any other Way have made. Whatever they fell their Wheat, Flour and Bread for in Portugal or Spain, is generally fent to London, which cannot amount to less than 25,000 l. per Ann. they remit from Newfoundland by Way of Spain, 4000 l. by their Trade to the Canaries, 4000 l. the remaining Part is fent directly over to Great-Britain; most of which Money as I have faid before, they take from the French and Dutch in the West-Indies: And without this Trade to the Dutch and French Colonies, they would not be able to make Remittances to above half that Sum in Cash, nor capable of making Remittances for the half of the Remainder in Goods. The Prices of Rum and Sugar and Moloffes, which they cannot live without, and without which they cannot carry on Trade among the Indians, nor trade to Newfoundland, would be loft to them by the raifing of the Prices of those Commodities in our Islands.

The Provinces of the East and West New Jersey's, as they lie between Pensilvania and the Province of New York, fall next in Order to be treated of. As they are at prefent under the Government of the fame Person with New-York; and as their Productions
