106 CARS AT JUNCTION FEW PRIME CATTLE

Many of Medium Grade—Trade Brisk—Hogs 10c Higher at \$6.60.

Receipts of live stock at the Union Stock Yards were 106 cars, consisting of 2236 cattle, 38 hogs, 30 sheep and 100 calves.

The quality of fat cattle, with the exception of a few loads, was not just as good as would be expected at this season of the year.

Prices ranged from \$3.10 to \$5.40 per cwt.; the bulk selling at \$5.20 to \$5.30; bulls, \$4.25 to \$4.50 per cwt.

Best butchers sold at \$5 to \$5.25 per cwt. for hogs, a few small lots selected from good loads brought a little more money.

About 200 veal calves and springers sold at \$3.10 to \$3.60 per cwt.

Sheep and Lambs. A limited number of sheep sold at \$6 per cwt.
