A PERSONATOR FREED.

William Rose Released on a Writ Habeas Corpus by Chancellor Boyd —Mr4. Longbottom Victorious Osgoode Hall, Jan. 22, 1896.

The application of William Rose, the convicted personator, for a writ of habeas corpus, was yesterday grant-ed by Chancellor Boyd, on technical grounds. The application was argued by Nicholas Murphy, Q.C., for the prisoner, who pointed out that while the statute under which the punishment statute under which the punishment for the offence was meted out contains two provisions, the second was the proper one to apply in this instance. The statute provides that the punishment for impersonation shall be (1) imprisonment, without the option of a fine, and with or without hard labor; (2) a fine of \$200, or in default of same, imprisonment for two months, without

a line, and with or without hard hard, (2) a fine of \$200, or in default of same, imprisonment for two months, without reference to labor. The learned Chancellor was of the opinion that the convicting Magistrate should have proceeded under the second section.

Mrs. Longbottom v. City of Toronto, the Chancellor refuses to disturb the verdict of \$500 for plaintiff for damages sustained by here when she fell into a hole in the sidewalk. The learned Chancellor holds that under the circumstances, the city was not prejudiced by want of notice from the plaintiff of particulars of the accident within 30 days from its happening, as required by 57 Vic., ch. 50 (O.), sec. 13. Thus the widow gets her mite, and the burden of the taxpayer is not appreciably increased.

Work for the Unempleved.

Editor World: The plans for co-operative farming outlined at the meeting in the Pavilion is perfectly correct to a certain extent, but cannot be looked apon as a permanent relief to the unemployed. The plan would be the same as the Huttriche societies scattered over this continent, where families live together on the same land and share the proceeds in common. This, however, would not meet the problem under consideration by the Labor Council in regard to the proposals to be made in the ex-Aid. Shaw competition for a solution of the question. Now, there is a system, which is not sufficiently known, in operation in Germany and Holland, and which does afford permanent relief. It is the organization under Government control of free labor colonles. Any man, at any time, is free togo to these colonies, be fed, housed and paid for his work, and leave when he likes. As part of the Empire, these colonies belong to the individual as a citizen of the Empire as much as they belong to anyone.

In Holland the whole family can go. This system is well worth study. Perhaps some of your readers can give you more information about them. I believe the system can be adapted in this country to the need of our population, and is particularly suitable to a new country with wast areas waiting to be brought under cultivation.

Also Advocated by the Secretary of State.

Speech at the Conservative Convention for Cape Breton - Unparalleled Enthusinsm and Unanimity Displayed by the People-Benefits Conferred by the National Policy and the Progressive Ideas of the Conservative Party.

Sydney, C.B., Jan. 23 .- The depth of feeling already elicited in this country was evidenced in the proceedings of to-day. Last night a wild northwest snowstorm raged throughout the country, blocking the roads and blockading railways. During yesterday scores of delegates from the extreme ends of the county arrived at Sydney, but delegates from the adjoining towns and mining centres started for the convention this morning. The train which started from Louisburg increased its passengers so rapidly that by the time It reached Glace Bay it carried 600

passengers, mostly delegates. Notwithstanding that the snowplew had been run over the road all night. the storm was so severe that the train was unable to get through the drifts and was stalled at Bridgeport, and did not get through until after 2

Meanwhile the convention, which met at 11 o'clock, remained in session until the train arrived, being addressed by Dr. McKay, M.L.A., John Mc-Cormack, M.L.A., Col. Chisholm, ex-M.L.A., C.E. Gregory, John Vooght, E. T. Moseley, ex-M.L.A., Dr. McKeen, Mr. McEachren, Mayor Purvis of North Sydney, H. T. McDougall, M.P., ex-Mayor McKinnon, W. H. Moore and others. These men made rousing speeches and fired the hearts of the people.

There is one thing the people of Cape Breton know how to do; they know how to cheer. In that line they can give lessons to all parts of Canada.

The Sperca-Making.

any degree by all the money with which the Liberals threaten to flood the county.

Crowded as the hall was before the snow-bound train arrived, it was packed to suffocation afterwards, and hundreds were unable to get inside. The enthusiasm of the addience, especially of the sturdy miners, was of a kind never before witnessed in Cape Breton, and the cheers which greeted the unanimous nomination of Sir Charles Tupper, tendered by standing vote, made the great building shake.
