Canadian Spring Wheat in London

Market.

No. 1 Northern is the standard of the scontract wheat in the London market. Under the rules of that market, sellers are permitted to substitute any other grade of wheat in lieu of standard, on paying to the buyer a stipulated penalty for the privilege and such other charge as the arbitrators of the board may decide upon as the difference in value between the quality delivered and the standard grade.

Some doubt being entertained as to whether Canadian spring wheat would be subject to the penalty, Mr. Whilam Schultz, manager of the London Pro.Clearing House Limited, states, in a letter to Mr. George Broomhall, dated London, E.C., June 21: "With reference to the interpretation of section 20 of the company's regulation for future delivery, business in wheat, we beg to inform you that 'American spring wheat' shall, in accordance with the custom of the trade, be held to include spring wheat grown in Canada. Such wheat found to be of quality not lower than No. 1 Northern spring, Duluth certificate, would therefor not incur a penalty."

U. S. Government Crop Report. U. S. Government Crop Report.

Henry A. King & Co.'s special from Washington to-day says: Government crop report makes the condition of winter wheat 85.7; against 91.2 last year and spring wheat 95.0 against 81.2 last year.

The average condition of corn 90.5, aithough 7.6 points higher than the condition last year, is, with the exception of 1832 and 1897, the lowest July condition in 10 years. Conditions vary widely: Iowa 100, Nebraska and Ohio 90, Kansas and Hlinois 83 and Missouri 78. The wheat yield will be about 603,000,000 bushels.

Other Crop Reports,

The Nebraska State Agricultural Board at Lincoln received reports which indicate wheat crop already harvested exceeds 25,000,000 bushels. Some of it shipped east, but most of it being housed and held for later markets.

A Dallas despatch says: It is estimated 300,000 bushels of wheat will be marketed here during the current week, and before August receipts will exceed 3,000,000 bushels. No damage done by rain. Farmers cemplain that they cannot get more than 60c per bushel.

The Future on Wall-street.

The present situation differs so widely from the situation at the time of the battle of Manila that it is impossible to think favorable developments in the war could now, as they did then, lead to a broad and sustained speculation. With prices of most of the leading stocks 10 points or more above the level of early May, the attitude of the outside speculator toward the market is a wholly different one. It is doubtful whether such a welcome event as a treaty of peace could so excite the enthusiasm of the speculative public as to render them indifferent to those problems which more directly concern the future economic growth of the country. Unquestionably, perceived in the market, because it will be helping to remove one of the principal checks upon speculative enterprise. But recent occurrences have made it plain that something more than inspiring war news is needed before the present unight level of prices will seem attractive to the outside buyer. He must be satisfied that the flattering estimates of this season's harvests will not prove to be exaggerated. He must be convinced that the needs of home and foreign consumption will be sufficient to obtain for the farmer a fair price for his products; so that the business of the railroads and the trade of the country in general will not be injured by the withholding of these products from market. Lastly, as a technical consideration of much significance, the outside buyer must be assured that those powerful interests whose support is essential to every broad speculative movement, have sufficient confidence in the outlook to undertake an active campaign for advancing prices.

Chicago Gossip. Henry A, King & Co., 12 King-street east, received the following despatch to-day from Chicago: Wheat—As generally expected, the markets have displayed very little speculative interest to-day, the trade generally waiting for the result of the crop conditions, and Government report. The large shipments from India of over 2,000,000 bushels raised the world's weekly shipments up to about 6,000,000 bushels, which is about one and a half million bushels below the weekly requirements. Wheat on passage showed a decrease of over 3,000,000 bushels. Clearances from American ports to-day, 370,000 bushels wheat and flour. General increase of receipts of new wheat is noted all over—77,000 bushels in St. Louis and about 20 cars here—most of which was sold at from 1c to 3c per bushel lower than Saiurday's price. This, with the Liverpool cables which were somewhat lower, was the depressing feature. While cash wheat remains from 5c to 20c over September, it offers strong inducements for the farmers to crowd their grain into market, therefore liberal receipts are expected.

Corn—The unexpected increase in the corn visible, together with the approaching Government report, caused liberal selling. Quite a general feeling has grown up among traders that a decline immediately after the Government report is one of the probable things to be looked for, and the bellef has become so general that many holders are inclined to liquidate. The quite large stocks held here is also another bear feature.

Provisions—Hog products have displayed rather unusual strength, in view of large receipts of hogs, being about 13,000 held over Saturday's estimate. Packers seem to be very friendly to the long side, and were the buyers. One noted speculator sold about 400,000 ribs, which were quickly absorbed, without causing any decline.
