WHEAT FELL ANOTHER CENT

Chicago Future Market Still on the Down Grade.

Liverpool Lower-Heavy Argentine Shipments a Bearer Factor - Clearances Good - Corn Markets on Both Sides of the Water Depreciated-Local Grain, Produce and Live Stock Markets - Notes and Gossip.

Friday Evening, Feb. 3. Liverpool wheat was heavy to-day. Spot declined 1d to 1 1/2d per cent, and futures 1/2d for the day.

Chicago wheat kept on the down-grade to-day. There was a slight temporary rally in the early part of the session, but selling by scared longs soon had its effect, and futures dropped a full cent a bushel. The slump at Liverpool and heavy Argentine shipments helped the decline. The only bull argument was 700,000 bushels of wheat reported cleared for export at the seaboard. The close was at near bottom point for the day.

Liverpool maize to-day declined 1/4d to 1/2d per cent. Chicago corn sold nearly half a cent per bushel to-day.

Lard is off 3d at Liverpool. Exports at New York to-day: Flour, 11,163 barrels and 12,597 sacks; wheat, 50,610 bushels.

Argentine wheat shipments the past week, 624,000 bushels, against 40,000 bushels the previous week. Corn shipments, 152,000 bushels, against 288,000 bushels.

Wheat receipts at Liverpool the past three days, 125,000 cwt., including 328,000 cwt. of American; corn same time, 156,000 cwt.

Receipts of wheat at Minneapolis and Duluth to-day, 410 cars, as against 422 cars the corresponding day of last year.

Corn receipts at Chicago to-day: Wheat 60, corn 715, oats 184.

LOCAL LIVE STOCK.

The receipts of live stock at the Cattle Market to-day were large—50 carloads, composed of 1009 cattle, 700 sheep, 1000 hogs and 25 calves. This, together with 40 carloads on Thursday, made the largest run of stock this season.

The quality of fat cattle was very fair, considering the large number delivered. Trade generally good, especially for the best grades of fat cattle, and yearling lambs, steers and feeders.

Export Cattle—Several straight loads of exporters came forward, but the bulk of fat cattle came in as mixed loads.

Prices remain fairly steady, but firm, at \$4.50 to \$4.75 per cwt. for choice loads of heavy cattle; light exporters sold at \$4.30 to \$4.50 per cwt.

A few picked lots of choice heavy exporters sold 10c to 15c per cwt. more than the above quotations, but these were exceptional, and must not be regarded as the rule.

Export Bulls—Choice heavy bulls sold at \$3.00 to \$4, with an odd one of extra quality and bred at 2 1/2c per cwt. extra. Light and medium export bulls sold at \$3.25 to \$3.50 per cwt.

Loads of good butchers and exporters, mixed, sold at \$3.85 to \$4.12 1/2 per cwt.

Butchers' Cattle—Choice picked lots of butchers' cattle, equal in quality to the best exporters, but not as heavy, weighing from 1000 to 1150 each, sold at \$4.10 to \$4.30 per cwt.

Loads of good butchers' cattle sold at \$3.70 to \$3.90, and medium at \$3.55 to \$3.60 per cwt.

Loads of common butchers' cattle sold at \$3 to \$3.25, and inferior at \$2.75 to \$3 per cwt.

Stockers—Trade in stockers was brisk, selling all the way from \$3.25 to \$3.40 for inferior to medium, and \$3.70 to \$3.70 for choice lots.

Stock Heifers—A few of this class, weighing 800 lbs. each, and from \$2.80 to \$2.85 per cwt.

Feeders—Choice heavy feeders, weighing from 1000 to 1150 lbs. each, are in good demand, selling from \$3.75 to \$4 for choice bred steers.

Cows—About 20 calves sold at a little higher price, general run being from \$14 to \$8 each, or \$5.50 per cwt. Five weight, Milk Cows—About 15 springers and milkers of medium quality generally sold at \$28 to \$42 each. A few good cows wanted.

Sheep—About 100 sheep and yearling lambs came in. Dressed sold at \$3 to \$3.25, and hucks at \$2.50 to \$2.75 per cwt.

Lambs—Yearling lambs were firmer, selling all the way from \$4.25 to \$4.50 per cwt., the latter price being paid for lambs weighing 100 lbs. and over, for export purposes.

Hogs—Deliveries continue to be light—1000 to-day—prices unchanged at \$4.25 to \$4.27 1/2 for choice, select bacon hogs, weighing from 160 to 200 lbs.; light hogs, \$4 to \$4.20; thick fats, \$3.75 per cwt.

William Levack bought 175 cattle, mixed butchers and exporters, at \$3.40 to \$4.20 per cwt., and several export bulls at \$3.40 to \$4.20.

W. H. Dean bought two loads of export-ers, 1150 lbs. each, at \$4.30 to \$4.50 per cwt.

Hulligan & Lunness bought four loads of exporters at \$4.25 to \$4.90 per cwt., and one load of feeders, 1025 lbs. each, at \$3.70 per cwt.

Bonnet & Halligan bought one load mixed butchers, 1000 lbs. each, at \$3.50; one load mixed butchers and exporters, 1000 lbs. each, at \$4 per cwt., less 5c on the lot, and one load mixed butchers and exporters at \$4.25 per cwt.

Alex. Levack bought 12 choice butchers' cattle at \$4 to \$4.30 per cwt.

J. Vance sold one load exporters, 1300 lbs. each, at \$4.75 per cwt.

P. Holland bought two heavy feeders, 1110 lbs. each, at \$4 per cwt.

Joseph Gould bought 12 carloads of exporters, ranging from \$4.50 to \$4.85 per cwt., and averaging from 1200 to 1300 lbs. each; five double-decks of yearling export lambs at \$4.40 to \$4.50 per cwt.

Maybee & Zeigman bought one load exporters, 1275 lbs. each, at \$4.75, and one load of export lambs at \$3.25 per cwt., which are being shipped via New York to Hamilton, Bermuda, which is another new market being opened up for Canadian live stock.

William Murphy bought 215 cattle on Thursday and Friday, composed of stock-ers, feeders, butchers and exporters, paying from \$3.40 to \$3.70 for stockers, \$3.00 to \$3.50 for feeders, \$4 to \$4.40 for butchers and \$4.25 to \$4.80 per cwt. for exporters.

D. O'Leary sold 12 exporters, 1175 lbs. each, at \$4.75; 10 butchers' cows, 2080 lbs. each, at \$3.25 per cwt.

Shipments per C.P.R.: William Levack, three loads: A. Montreuil, two cars: A. McDonald, three loads, and A. Ironsides, one car, all via St. John, for export, and Joseph Featherston, M.P., one load of stockers to Streetville.

Mr. T. Peers of the firm of Cramp & Peers, wholesale commission agents, of London, Liverpool and Manchester, was on the market to-day, and is staying at the
