Mine La Motte Lead and Smelting Company owns 37,614 acres of ground located in Madison and St. Francois Counties, Southeastern Missouri. Of that total 13,544 acres are known to be heavily mineralized. Only 20 acres have been developed by underground workings, and about 67 acres by surface or shallow mining. The property is producing to-day under very limited operation more than \$150,000 a year. The present management has already contracted for machinary and improvements that will swell this annual output to at least \$500,000. Present shafts and drifts place in sight ore enough to tax all available machinery for centuries. ### PRESENT WORKINGS

There are five shafts on the Mine La Motte Estate numbered 2, 4, 5, 6 and 7.

Three of these, Nos. 2, 4 and 6, are now being worked, and any one could easily supply all ore required by the present mill.

Shaft No. 2 has a depth of 110 feet and is in first-class condition. Two levels or ore horizons are worked in this shaft, the upper level at a depth of about 60 feet. The lower level has an ore horizon of about 20 to 22 feet, in which the galena is found. The daily production of ore is 20 cars, averaging 5600 lbs, each.

Shaft No. 4 has been recently overhauled and is in fine condition ; it is 130 feet deep. Two levels are also worked from this shaft and the general character and quality of the ore is the same as found in Shaft No. 2. The daily ore production is 12 cars.

Shaft No 6 has a depth of 118 feet and differs somewhat in formation from Shufts Nos. 2 and 4 in that the ore is found principally in the vertical seams or fissures, the bedding planes and in pockets where it has collected in considerable masses. This shaft produces 9 cars of ore daily.

Shaft No. 5 is not being worked at present, but has the same general characteristics as Shafts Nos. 2 and 41 Shaft No. 7 has been but recently completed and no ore has yet been milled from it. It is 170 feet deep, and the arifts show a fine body of high-grade ore. This shaft is fully equipped with pump and cage hoist and is connected with the mill by tramway. It is ready to begin producing ore at once.

The deep mining of the past 25 years can be looked upon as simply development work, for the mines are now in condition to produce almost any desired quantity of ore daily The pig-lead produced is one of the standards and known as "Anchor Brand."

The first quarterly dividend at this rate will be paid January 15th, 1903.
