READ A THIRD TIME.

Hamilton's I rotest Against the T. and H. Bill Unheeded.

Ottawa, Sept. 24.—Special.)-The Toronto and Hamilton bill was read a third time in the Senate to-day. Hamilton's protest against the railway crossing the beach was not heeded. Sir Mackenzie Bowell said the request of the people of Hamilton was impracticable. Senator Scott said he had already sent a reply to the petitioners, pointing out that it was too late to make any alterations in the bill. Several important amendments were made to the railway bill. Section 122

made to the railway bill. Section 122 was amended so as to transfer the power of approving the location of lines from the board to the Minister. Senator Scott moved an amendment to clase 239, providing that railway companies shall pay damages caused by fire started from a railway locomotive whether caused by the negligence of the company or not only up to \$5000.

the company or not, only up to \$5000, to recover a great sum negligence on the part of the company must be proved. This amendment was subjected to considerable criticism from Senators who argued that it was almost imposwho argued that it was almost impossible for farmers to prove negligence. Senator Lougheed struck the popular sentiment of the House when he said that all railway companies were exempted up to the passing of this bill. This was a very large departure. Inasmuch as the board had power to say what precautions should be taken, it seemed to him unnecessary to make this The amendment was carried. Senator Watson, on behalt of Senator Kerr, Toronto, moved to restore subsection 4 of section 237, respecting cattle at large, and which had been amended by the Senate to its original form. The clause leaves the onus of proving negligence on the part of the owner of the cattle.

Senator Belque moved an amendment

Senator Beique moved an amendment providing that whenever an animal is killed or injured upon the property of the company, the fact that the animal got upon the property from land other than that of the owner of the animal, or that such an animal was not then in charge of some competent person, shall not deprive such owner of the right to recover from the company the amount of such loss. Senator Beique's motion carried.

Senator Watson moved his motion, that there should be no appeal in cases where the award was under \$200. This was carried.


