

Qualities suitable for American often advanced 10 per cent. Cross-breds, specially light conditioned, were in sellers' favor owing to the anxiety of home and American buyers to secure them. The strength is attributed to the recent expansion in the consumption in manufacturing centres, and to the fact that the direct imports are now going into stronger hands. The increased American demand for fine grades is responsible for hardening tendency in coarse cross-breds, altho the consumption of the latter is restricted by the dulness in the export yarn trade.
