income of the Great Newspaper-Revealed in a Trial.

London, Nov. 17 .- Most people will be interested in a case in the courts last week, brought by a recent purchaser of a small interest in the London Times' property. The Times has been profoundly secretive concerning its circulation and income, but the trial of the suit has been the accidental means of giving a clear index to the amount distributed in dividends

among the proprietors of this famous

Mr. Birnie Todd, of Brighton, was proceeded against for misrepresenting the income derivable from a fractional share in the Times, which he had sold to the Rev. Aurelian Adams for £354. Mr. Todd's share was described in court as one-fourteenth of two-thirds of one-ninth of two-sixteenths of the paper-or, reduced to a simple fraction one fifteen hundred and twelfth. He sold it to the clergyman on the representation that it was worth £25 per annum, whereas its actual income in 1894 was only £17 3s. 11d.

A simple calculation, based on these figures, shows the total amount dis-tributed among the Times' proprietors in dividends in that year £26,006. From similar data, given for 1893, it seems that the amount distributed was £27,973; while in 1892 the amount was £36,288. Of course these figures do not represent the total net income, as probably a substantial percentage is carried forward each year. But it is certain that the total net income is less than £40,000, or \$200,000, a year. Before its disastrous dealings with Forger Piggott and the era of the Parnel Commission, the net income of the Times was commonly reported to be \$400,000 a year, but competition of late years has grown much keener, whereas the expenditures, previously liberal,

GERMAN-AMERICANS

Will Be Watched While in the Fatherland. Berlin, Nov. 17 .- The Government announces that hencforth Germans naturalized as American citizens returning to Germany for any length of time will be subject to an especially strict surveillance and granted only a limited period of sojourn in the fatherland. If it shall be notoriously known that any of the returned German-Americans emigrated to the United States in order to avoid military service they will be immediately expelled from the country. Any of the persons described who shall extend their stay in Germany to two years may be drafted into the army, despite their naturalization, and required to serve a legal term in the military ser vice, if such persons have not passed the age of 31 years. If they are more than 31 years old they may be expelled. Sons of naturalized Germans born in America and coming to Germany for the purpose of permanent residence will be recognized as citizens of the United States, and will not be required to serve in the army.

Clifford Sifton, ex-Attorney-General of Manitoba, was sworn in a member of the Privy Council and Minister of the Interior at ten o'clock this morning by Sir Henry Strong, Chief Justice of Canada, who is Deputy Governor-General, acting on behalf of Lord Aberdeen. After taking the oath of office Mr. Sifton took charge of his department. He leaves by the afternoon train for

Winnipeg. Henry Robert Campbell, of the Interior Department, was appointed by Mr. Sifton to be his acting secretary. Mr. Sifton received a telegram from Lord Aberdeen congratulating him on his appointment, and regretting he was not present personally at the swearing-in ceremonial.

THE BLIND SEE

Wonderful Discovery With the X Ray Apparatus.

San Francisco, Nov. 17.-Lucien Bacigalupi, the totally blind son of the eeper of a public "X" ray display, has discovered that by the aid of the Roentgen ray he can see sufficiently to distinguish objects. While with Dr. G. Waverley Clark in the laboratory yesterday the physician gave the lad the flueroscope and he at once said he could see light. Keys, nails and other metallic objects were placed behind the blocks of wood and in purses, and the lad distinguished the forms readily. The test was made complete and such a stir has it made among medical and scientific men that a number of experiments will at once be made with persons who are blind.

ELICITED "AMENS

Appropriations by the M. E. Church

Missionary Committee. Detroit, Mich., Nov. 17 .- Details of appropriations for domestic missions occupied the general missionary committee of the M. E. Church today, and \$35,700 was assigned for German and Swedish mission work in the Idaho, Columbia River, Puget Sound, Oregon and Northern Pacific districts, and for Nonwegian work in the Northwest The new Mexican-Spanish work was allowed \$11,000.

During a discussion of the appropriations for Hawaii, Bishop Newman ncidentally remarked that the people of both Hawaii and Cuba should soon be prepared for living under the Am-erican flag. The remark brought out a decided "Amen" and "Praise God" from most of the brethren of the committee.
