#### THE LETTER CARRIERS' WAGES

Will Get the Statutory Increase-The Better Paid Officials Must Wait.

Ottawa, April 13.—The large increase In the business of the postoffice department, which has followed the revival of the country's prosperity, has had the effect of making it possible for the postmaster-general to take steps towards granting the statutory increases of salary to the letter carriers and other lower officials of the department this year, and it will be found, when the estimates are brought down, that these increases have been provided for in the postoffice appropriation. The postmasfied in increasing pro rata the wages of all the officials, and, therefore, only the officials receiving small stipends will receive increases in pay. The decision of the postmaster-general will be who will readily see that gentlemen in receipt of comfortable incomes can better afford to forego the increment than can their subordinates, to whom an increase of \$50 or so per year means a great deal. Mr. Mulock's decision will render unnecessary the visit to Ottawa of the representatives of the Letter-Carriers' Association, who had arranged to interview the postmaster-general with a view to laying before him their claims to increases in pay.

London, April 13.-The Berlin correspondent of the Morning Post says: Lord Salisbury, I learn, has definitely announced his adherence to the principle of unanimity in the Samoan commission, although filled with grave apprehensions as to the sentimental effect it may have on the commission's usefulness. The British and German governments have now arrived at an agreement.

#### THE CHURCH WAR.

The debate in the House of Commons on Mr. Hoare's anti-ritualistim resolution was saved from dullness by a moderate speech made by Mr. Arthur Balfour, the government leader in the house supporting Mr. Hoare's motion. He declared that if there was hope for the future of the Established Church, it could only lie the resolute determination of all moderate men who are loyal to the church to unite and express their intention not to allow the great fabric which was the work of generations of able and pious men to be destroyed by the frantic, short-sighted policy of honest but mistaken ecclesiastical theorists, whether belonging to one party or the other. He felt deeply that while men were disputing these matters of relatively small importance, there was perhaps irreparable injury being done, not only to the church, but to the whole cause of religion. Mr. George C. Bartley, member for North Islington, moved to add to Mr. Hoare's motion the words: "And to obey the law as decided by the courts which have jurisdiction in ecclesiastical matters." This rused strong opposition from the Ritual-This rused defend themselves. They profess obedience to the bishops and the prayer book, but repudiate the necessity of rubric by the courts.
