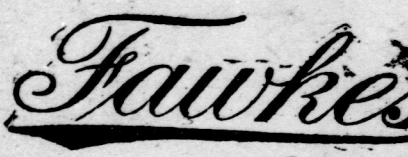

Hair to Fortune

IN SUNNY ALBERTA

Cold, Cheerless Weather Prevailed Recently—Sleet Did No Damage.

The Phoenix (Saskatoon) of Sept. 13 says:

The weather has taken another backward turn and chronic pessimists and wheat buyers are alike satisfied. The temperature last night touched freezing point for the first time this season in the Saskatoon district. The frost was not severe enough to hurt grain, but it was accompanied with an alarming fall of sleet which threatened at one time to develop into an unseasonable snowstorm.

It is just four weeks past on the 12th since a heavy fall of snow occurred in September. On that occasion in Manitoba it lay in many places over a foot deep. Fortunately harvest was over at the time, and although the shocks were loaded with snow no damage was done and after it melted a fine spell of Indian summer weather prevailed till the end of October. Many people had that storm in mind this morning when the eye rested on the whitened landscape.

But faith dies hard in the west and nowhere does one hear from men deeply interested even one note of alarm. There is a natural anxiety, but it is accompanied with a belief that bad as the weather may be at the moment it is but an accidental and the sun will come out in all his glory again in his own good time.

It is fortunate that the sleet did not last long enough to load down the growing crop. Farmers coming in from the trails today report that in odd places there are patches of grain laid over which will require to be cut one way, but that on the whole things are looking all right yet. Given a few days of bright weather the crop will be completely out of danger.
