

The Archbishop of Canterbury recently delivered a charge to the clergy-men in Ashford parish church, dealing with the confessional. He described the system as one which carried men back to Judaism, and as perilous to the privacy of domestic life. The Church of England in this respect made for freedom, and did not permit compulsion, either direct or indirect, and no priest had a right to require confession as a condition of confirmation or Holy Communion. To claim this was usurpation, and should be resisted.
