Rally in the Market at Toronto—Good Animals Soon Sold.

Toronto, June 21.—There has been quite a rally in the horse market during the past week, and while the sales have not been on an extensive scale, several supplementary orders from contractors and from the Northwest have been received that have given quite an air of briskness to the principal mart. Prices also have been firmer. Altogether it can safely be said that the condition of affairs is most satisfactory, and for the season of the year exceptionally good. Carriage horses are in light demand. Good delivery horses, animals that add appearance to substance, are eagerly snapped up, and it looks as if there will be some fall and noteworthy doings at the Dominion Day show.

Draught horses are hardly so much sought after as they were earlier in the year, but at that, sound, fresh young bloods experience little difficulty in finding purchasers at reasonable values.

Fonies are being widely inquired for with exceedingly few forthcoming. People seemingly object to pay over a hundred dollars for the little fellows, but there are positively none to be had of any account at anything less.

Drivers, under 15, are sharing in the pony prosperity, any offering of conformation being taken at prices that cannot be otherwise than considered good.

SYNOD OPPOSED TO A CHANGE IN MANAGEMENT OF ITS FUNDS

Old System Will Be Continued—Question Discussed an Entire Afternoon.

Yesterday afternoon's session of the Synod of the Diocese of Huron was entirely taken up with the presentation of the report on the bishop's charge, and with the discussion of the clause in the report of the office management committee, which stated that the synod was of the opinion that it was advisable to place the funds of the synod in the hands of a trust company, and that a committee be appointed, with power to make arrangements for such a change.

There were a great many different views expressed, and it was taken for granted by most of those who spoke on the subject that the placing of the funds in the hands of a trust company would involve the vacating of the present office of the synod in connection with St. Paul's Cathedral, and also deprive them of the use of Cronyn Hall as a meeting place. If it had been thoroughly understood by all who discussed the matter, as the bishop said after the debate was over, that the motion called only for the placing of the funds in a trust company, and that the matter of vacating their quarters at the cathedral was not up for discussion, and that therefore all the arguments regarding the effect it would have upon St. Paul's were useless, a great deal of time would have been saved.

It was argued by some members of the synod that the present expenses incurred in the handling of the funds is \$4,400 per year. It was estimated that a trust company would handle all the funds, look after the voluntary collections, provide a stenographer for the use of the synod officials, and give them the use of a room for meeting purposes all for about \$1,000 per year, and that in this way at the very least \$2,000 would be saved annually.

Others thought that even if the funds were given over to a trust company for investment, there would still be required some one to answer correspondence, look after meetings, etc., and that when the salary of such a person was added to the \$1,000, and also a large sum allowed for printing, stationery, telephone tolls, etc., the old system would be the most economical.

Some argued that if the funds were placed in the hands of a trust company there would always be a danger of the company's failure, in which case the result upon the synod would be very serious. This argument was eventually overthrown, when it was pointed out that the investments made by the company would be in the synod's name, and that thus no danger would be involved.

Arguments for Old System.

Some argued that a trust company would have its own funds to invest besides those of the synod, and therefore it would be quite possible that they would place their own funds out in the best paying investments, and that the funds of the synod might lie idle at times. In answer to this the synod was informed that in the event of the funds being placed in the hands of a trust company, the latter would be pledged to give the synod the advantage of as good investments as could be obtained.

It was held out by others that the security given by a trust company would not be sufficient.

In answer to this it was pointed out that the expert inspector of the company was not likely to ever over-estimate the property, in the case of a mortgage, as his situation depends upon a correct valuation, and that he would always err on the safe side.

A great many held that never had one body of men so long as the present, and that no fault could be found with it; therefore, the best plan was to let good enough alone. They pointed out further that the Toronto Synod

was only getting 4 per cent on its money, while the Synod of Huron was getting 5 per cent.

A large number also argued that definite offers should be secured from the trust companies before any decision was reached.

A great many arguments were advanced regarding the vacating of the present office and the effect upon St. Paul's, but these had no bearing upon the question.

The discussion finally brought the question down to three standpoints of comparison—Economy, efficiency and security.

Motion for Change Defeated.
About 6 o'clock a vote was taken, and the resolution was defeated by 57 to 61.

Thus the present office will be retained.

Bishop Williams did not appear to be satisfied with the action of the synod in rejecting the motion, for after the vote had been taken he addressed the synod, reminding them that they were going into debt at the rate of \$800 a year, and that they had just rejected a means of getting out of the difficulty. His lordship said that he did not see any way open for them now, and wanted to know what they were going to do, or if they were content to sink deeper and deeper into debt.

The synod adjourned until this morning, when the discussion of the other clauses of the report of the office management committee will take place.

Conference on Missions.
The corresponding committee of the M. S. C. presented its report at a conference on missions held in Cronyn Hall last night.

The report stated that the church's efforts to meet its obligations to Canadian and foreign missions has been a real blessing to the church itself. The attendance at the meetings of the society has always been large, and the spread of information and the awakening of the missionary interest have been given particular attention. The sum of \$90,641.73 was raised in 1905, being \$1,921.44 more than the previous year. The portion of the grand total contributed by the Diocese of Huron was \$11,565.63, being \$321.03 more than last year, but \$2,390.33 less than their apportionment.

The committee urged that every clergyman in the diocese should realize his responsibility with respect to the church's missionary work and that it was the first duty of the church to evangelize the world.

Mr. E. J. B. Pense, M.L.A., of Kingston, was called upon by the bishop to address the synod on missionary work. Mr. Pense said that one of the best missionary movements now in progress is what is being done by the church at present in Canada. The twentieth century belongs to Canada as the nineteenth century belonged to the United States, and it is our duty to make the growing west keep up with the church work of the east. He spoke of the need of more Canadian pastors, and expressed the thought that greater efforts to have Canadian pastors would show the progress of the people of the Dominion.

Mr. Pense spoke of church union, and said that the movement was of vast importance and extremely desirable. He thought that the Church of England should take the leading position in such a movement, because the doctrine proposed covered most of the points required by the church doctrine.

The next speaker was Rev. Canon Cody, of Toronto, whose address was along the line of home missions. He pointed out the great need for support for the missions in the Northwest. He said that the necessity for handing the amount to the missions in the west as early as possible is very urgent because in some cases the conditions are such that other funds have to be taken to pay the ministers' salaries. He pointed out the extraordinary position in which Canada is placed, and mentioned the call for missions which comes from China, Persia, Japan, Africa, India and other countries.

ALLAN LINE REACHES OUT
Will Develop American Service and Build Bigger Turbines.

Glasgow, Scotland, June 21.—The Allan Line has decided on the active development of its American service and as a beginning contracts have already been drawn up for the construction of two new turbine liners, larger than the Virginian and Victorian lately built for the Canadian traffic.

HORSE STOLEN.

Thamesville, Ont., June 21.—A young man about 25 years old, 5 feet 6 inches in height, light complexion, clean shaven, and weighing about 150 pounds, is wanted on a charge of stealing a white horse and a Milner buggy and harness yesterday from McEachern's livery here.

PULP PLANT BURNED.

Quebec, June 21.—The Chicoutoum Pulp Company's plant has been destroyed by fire. Loss \$20,000. Insured.
