"Accident" at St. Petersburg Cuts Off Capital from the Interior - Reds Loot Government Train.

St. Petersburg, July 28. - The switchboard of the central telegraph station in St. Petersburg was burned out this morning, destroying all communication with the provinces. While there is a suspicion that the "accident" was arranged by revolutionists, no evidence to support it can be found, and the telegraph department authorities are apparently satisfied with the explanation of the employes. However, the public is cut off from telegraph communication with the interior for some time, but the Government retains the possibility of communicating with the provincial authorities over the railroad wires. AN APPEAL MADE TO THE COLONIES

Help Against Dutch.

To Let Kruger's Reactionary Dutch Cabinet Govern Transvaal Would Dismember Empire.

London, July 28. - The Transvas Progressive delegates, now in England have issued an appeal to their fellowcolonists in other British colonies. The appeal asserts that this is a critical moment in the history of South Africa -perhaps the most critical in her history. South Africa, as well as Great Britain, is concerned.
