Last Wednesday Mrs. Mitchell was on duty by 9 o'clock and Mrs. McKeown within an hour after. But that isn't anything unusual. If they didn't get in a good long day, they couldn't get in such a good, profitable day.

Even with their blg achievements Red Cross day, and the long hours of bending over the sewing machines, they aren't satisfied that they have done enough. They must needs take home sewing to finish up between times. They never fail to make at least two shirts each during the week, and sometimes their score runs as high as a dozen each. Then, it is time to Red Cross Auxiliary, make sixteen shirts every Wednesday at the rooms in the Normal School, taking several to make up at home each week,
