SASKATOON HAS PLAN TO USE MILITARY RECORDS TO IMPROVE THE NATION

Asks Council Here To Indorse Scheme

To Benefit Public Health.

Saskatoon city council has asked the London council to indorse a resolution which it has just passed, dealing with a plan which it has to improve the health of the people of the Dominion.

The proposal is that the records of the military service act, shall be utilized. It points out that under the first class of the act about 30 to 40 per cent of those liable for service were placed in category E.

The Saskatoon Council believes that these records should be made use of so that steps may be taken to remedy the physical defects of men found to be suffering from curable defects. It contends that such men should be advised of such defects and treated for them. The resolution calls attention to the fact that parents defective physically or mentally produce weak defective children, and this weakens the human race and causes national deterioration. It believes that the use of the military records will in a measure combat this.

MARY FAILS TO SEE ANGELIO ATTRIBUTES

She Lays Charge Against Angelo of Assaulting Her.

Angelo as a Christian name is a misnomer when applied to a certain resident of the foreign section of the city who bears the name of Moschello, says Mary Tricomo, who alleges that the said Angelo showed no angelic characteristics when he assaulted her on August 16, causing bodily harm. This is according to the information which she has laid against him in police court.

The case was to have been tried Tuesday, but was laid over until Aug. 23. The accused was allowed out on bail in the meantime. Mary showed signs of having been through a heavy encounter, and it is said she has been in the hospital, but nothing to substantiate this can be learned.

WORK OR FIGHT

Magistrate Not Impressed With Any Excuses Offered.

"The trouble is he works at nights. He is one of those night hawks." Thus did Chief of Police W. T. Williams designate Charles Cole, who appeared in court Tuesday to answer a charge of having no useful occupation.

Cole told the magistrate that his business was dull in the country at present. He has been idle during the past month, he admitted, and he has turned his team out to pasture. If he does not find something to do in the next week, he will have to go to jail, the court intimated, adjourning the case until next Tuesday.

"Every person who comes before me on this charge will either have to work or go to jail, where he can be made to do something," said Magistrate Graydon. "If a man is not physically able to go to the front he will have to work if at all fit to do so," he concluded.

MANY PAY FINES FOR BREAKING TRAFFIC LAWS

Harvey Near, for cutting the corner of Talbot and Dundas streets on August 15, was summoned to answer in court Tuesday.

The case was adjourned until today on account of the absence of witnesses.

Nine offenders against the traffic by-law were assessed \$2 and costs each. One whose offence was of a more trifling nature paid \$1 and costs. For following the crowd across the vacant lot at the corner of Elizabeth and Piccadilly street, Frank Spettigue was fined \$1. He asked that a stip be placed at the spot to warn his drivers against committing the same offence. The court thought as the lot is not public property and there is a sidewalk in front of it over which it is necessary for teamsters to drive their wagons to take the short cut, the lady ought to know that they are doing wrong. "If they persist in using the short cut over the walk and across the field, they will be brought to court and they will have to pay the fine," said Magistrate Graydon. Spettigue then asked for permission to place a sign on the property at his own expense, but it was pointed out that this the court had no power to grant.

FORMER LONDONER IN WINNIPEG DROPS DEAD

John E. Platt Was Well-Known Druggist in City.

Word was received in this city Tuesday of the death of John Edward Platt, a former resident of this city, who dropped dead in Winnipeg this Tuesday.

Mr. Platt was well known here, being, prior to his departure for the west, a very popular Talbot street druggist. He later sold his store to the W. Taylor Company, which is operating it at the present time.

Mr. Platt, at the time of his death, was employed in a military camp at Winnipeg in the medical department, as a druggist. No particulars can be learned as to his death.

He is survived by four sisters and one brother, namely, Mrs. Frederick Turville, Alice and Ada O. Oxford street west, Mrs. Charles Coombes, Talbot street, and Herbert, Oxford street west.

STOLEN CAR RECOVERED.—An auto which was reported stolen by William McLean of Inwood on Sunday evening was recovered on Monday about four miles from the city on the Gore road by the local detectives. There was no damage done to the car, and it has been returned to the owner. Apparently the joy riders ran out of gasoline and abandoned the machine at the roadside.

COUNTY TREASURER RAISES FINE SO SOLDIER CAN PROCEED OVERSEAS
