LOAN SUBSCRIPTIONS WILL EXCEED TOTAL

Ottawa, Dec. 9.—That a greater amount of actual cash will be released from the recent Victory Loan leased from the recent Victory Loan than from the record loan preceding, it is the confident expectation of the officials in charge of the loan at Ottawa. A total of \$610,000,000 was raised from the last loan. The recent loan will exceed that amount, a fact which is somewhat remarkable in view of the fact that the tax exemption clause is lacking.

The loan committee is here today conferring with Sir Henry Drayton, minister of finance, and completing the allocation. While bona fide subscriptions total much higher than the above-mentioned sum, subscriptions of certain of the larger companies will be shaded down to prevent inflation, which might ensue from impairment of their ordinary investing powers and capacity.

All these officials are active members of Sir Edward Carson's Ulsterte party, and signed the famous Ulster Covenant against home rule; but the rumor is discredited because Andrew Bonar Law, lord privy seal, and Walter Hume Long, first lord of the admiralty, both are strong Carsonite members of the cabinet, and it is not considered likely that the premier would proceed with a bill lacking their acquiescence.

If the rumors are true it would mean a rupture of the coalition government and a general election.


