YORK COUNTY AND SUBURBS

REFEREE ALLOWS LIENS ON FAIR BUILDINGS

Claims for Work Done for Markham Agricultural Board Heard at Osgoode Hall.

Before R. R. Neville, official referee at Osgoode Hall, yesterday morning, a case involving a large amount of money, and which has attracted widespread interest through York County, was given a preliminary hearing and later adjourned in the hope that some amicable arrangement might be arrived at.

Early in the summer of 1916 the Markham Agricultural Board awarded a contract to John Miller of Unionville for the erection of a fair building at Markham Village, at a cost in the neighborhood of \$8000. Subsequently, according to the statement of Miller and a large number of witnesses at Osgoode Hall yesterday, the plans were altered, the changes involving between \$3000 and \$4000, and the agricultural board are said to be unwilling to pay. A number of liens have been filed against the fair building, the largest of which are registered by the Peckler people of Oshawa, while other amounts range from \$500 down. Practically every lien filed was allowed by the referee.

Before adjournment and after the disposal of the lien cases William Douglas, representing the Markham Fair Board, complained that he had not been aware of the fact that it was intended to break the original contract as between Miller and the fair board, and asked for an enlargement of view of the fact that documents bearing on the fire in the Dineen building in which the fair board is now housed, were in the possession of the fair board, and were not to be made available to the public.

CHARGES OF FAVORITISM WERE QUITE UNFOUNDED

The city waterworks department yesterday acting under instruction from Commissioner Harris, notified the York Township authorities that all diplomatic relations had been broken off following the statement in a morning paper, that reflections had been cast upon the city department by the township engineer at yesterday's meeting of the council. The charges made by W. H. Taylor, assistant in the absence of Frank Barber, chief engineer, who was in Ottawa, were to the effect that officials of the waterworks department were using every effort to place business with the Drummond McCall Company, to the exclusion of other firms in the supply of certain valves used in the proposed waterworks.

When the statement was yesterday brought to the attention of Commissioner Harris, he got in touch with Frank Barber, who had in the meantime returned to the city, and intimated pretty clearly his opinion of the statements alleged to have been made. The chief engineer expressed surprise that his subordinate had stepped the mark, and on behalf of Reeve Griffiths and the members of the York Township Council disclaimed all responsibility for the unfortunate statement.

The whole matter has now smoothed over and Commissioner Harris stated the township engineer that the arrangements entered into by the city will be carried out to the letter. It was understood that one of the contracts which has not been definitely awarded, and for which the tenders were opened, will be recalled.

WAR SUMMARY

THE DAYS EVENTS REVIEWED

(Continued From Page 1.)

French require. As a great many French soldiers have received leave to go home to plant this season's crops, their absence from the front may delay the full force of the allied spring offensive for a few weeks.

An official communication of the Canadian war records office, issued yesterday, gives the truth concerning the Canadian operations of last week.

Owing to an exaggerated unofficial report sent out from Ottawa many people believed that the Canadians had moved down to the Ancre and were engaged in a full offensive operation. In reality they successfully carried out a trench raid so large as to be classed as a minor operation.

This big action extended along a frontage of 2000 yards and to a depth of 700 yards. Owing to the broken ground, pitted with shell holes, the Germans had facilities for offering a stronger resistance than usual to the rushes of the Canadians, and these also encountered resistance at the German line of supporting trenches. They reached all their objectives, however, and they remained in the German positions for an hour and a half before returning to their own line. Meanwhile they did great damage to the German trenches and dugouts. The Canadians lost Lieut.-Col. Kemball, C.B., of Vancouver, and Lieut.-Col. Barrett of Toronto, who were killed while leading their men. On the whole the enterprise was a big success for the Canadians.

On the other fronts the war still rages subdued. The French have fought some fierce local actions north of the Caucuries Wood, on the eastern bank of the Meuse. On the eastern front winter warfare still prevails. In Persia, the Russians, after driving the enemy from Hamadan, have pushed him close to the frontier, and they are now scaling a mountain range and passing the summit. The Turks are also receding before the Russians in the Bitlis region.
