Montreal, July 28.—(Canadian Press.)-A stir was caused in financial circles this afternoon by the announcement on the floor of the stock exchange today that the brokerage firm of Thornton Davidson & Company had gone into voluntary liquid-

The announcement of suspension followed a somewhat protracted period of reports of difficulties in connection with the firm, the development occasioning little surprise in market circles, altho the actual suspension of the firm's floor members caused some considerable degree of excitement in the financial district. A combination of circumstances, involving an over-extended position in several stocks of the specialty category and troubles of a more personal nature, are said to have precipitated the liquidation of the firm, which was finally unable to meet the demands of its creditors, both private and institutional.

Lenine Favors Reasonable Conditions to Poles: Trotzky Would Humiliate Them.

London, July 28.—The success or failure of the proposal to hold a conference in London between representatives of the entente and those of so-viet Russia and the Russian border states, depends almost wholly on the armistice terms which Russia will lay states, depends almost wholly on the armistice terms which Russia will lay down to the Poles, probably on Saturday, in the opinion of officials here. Intimations have reached official quarters in London that the Russians themselves are not finding it easy to decide on terms. One faction led by Lenine, is reported to be in favor of terms that it would be reasonable to suppose the Poles would accept, while Trotzky and some of his intimates are represented as insisting upon terms so humiliating that the Poles would be forced to continue fighting, or overthrow their government if the terms were accepted. Should the latter contingency arise it would be useless to attempt to hold a conference. Simultaneously with the despatch of the note to the Bolsheviki suggesting the conference, the British government invited Letvia. Lithuania, Finland and Esthonia to participate. The first three accepted whole-heartedly; Esthonia sent word that it was willing to participate, but did not express warm approval of the plan.
