SERIOUS BLOW FOR THE GAY WHITE WAY

New York, May 21—Many Broadway restaurants, hotels and theatres will be hit by the government order prohibiting unarmored Germans within a half-mile of a state armory or arsenal, it was learned today.

The National Guard arsenal is at Seventh avenue and Thirty-sixth street, a short distance from Broadway, and there are several armories within a half-mile of the "White Light district" above that point.

United States Marshal Thomas D. McCarthy has announced his intention of enforcing the restriction rigidly, which means that the enemy alien patronage of all dining and amusement places in the prescribed zones will be cut off. Some of the most popular restaurants of the city will be affected.

Marshal McCarthy said today that he had asked for fifty additional deputies to aid in checking up the German residents of the proscribed zones and in pointing the districts when the "no" goes on. He declared that permits would be issued only in cases of dire necessity—which will not include social calls or amusement trips—and all enemy aliens caught within the lines after they are established will be arrested.

Arrest will mean internment for the period of the war, unless the prisoner can establish his citizenship.

Mr. McCarthy said that figures compiled by him indicated that about 14,000 residents of the southern federal district of New York will be affected by the order.

Soldiers' Families Return

An ocean liner which arrived in Halifax on Monday, brought home from the old country a great number of widows and children, wives and relatives of Canadian soldiers at the front. Most of those who returned are destined for western points.

HINTS FOR GARDENING

(By W. Saxby Blair, Supt. Experimental Station, N.S.)

CORN.

A warm, friable, rich soil should be selected for garden corn. The seed is sown in hills three and one-half feet apart each way, and five plants allowed to develop in a hill. The seed is sown soon after the middle of May. Early and late varieties should be planted to extend the supply of table corn into the fall. As is the case with peas and beans, constant surface cultivation to keep the weeds down and maintain a loose surface mulch is necessary.

PEAS.

Garden peas may be sown as soon as the ground is fit to work. The land should be fall manured with ten to fifteen tons of well rotted manure per acre, and ploughed. This is well worked in the spring to a depth of five inches. The seed is usually sown in rows two and one-half feet apart, and the seed planted one inch apart in the row.

Dwarf and semi-dwarf varieties do not require staking. It is advisable to stake the tall-growing sorts.

If one variety only is used, successive sowings should be made every week or ten days until the first of June. The garden peas is a cool season vegetable, and will not do well during the heat of summer. The season may be extended also by planting late maturing varieties. The early seedling is usually made one to one and one-half inches deep; the later seeding, two to three inches deep.

RADISH.

The radish may be sown as soon as the ground is fit to work, in rows one foot apart, and the plants thinned to one inch apart. Successional sowings may be made one week apart until the first of June.

LETTUCE.

Any good garden soil will grow lettuce. The ground should be rich and fairly friable. The seed may be sown inside six weeks before planting outside is possible. The plants are developed as in the case with cabbage. They may be set in rows one foot apart, and six inches apart in the row.

Seed may be sown in the open ground as soon as it is fit to work, and the plants thinned to four or six inches apart. Successional sowings may be made every two weeks until the first of August. Seed may be sown in rows of June for a fall crop on well prepared soil.

7,000,000 KILLED IN WAR

Arthur Henderson Estimates Total Casualties Exceed England's Population

London, May 22—The number of men killed in the war thus far was estimated at 7,000,000 by Arthur Henderson, member of the War Council, in an address at Richmond. He estimated the total casualties of the war to be in excess of the population of the United Kingdom. The population of the United Kingdom, according to the census of 1911, was 45,870,000.
