SINN FEIN FOOD

CONTROL IN IRELAND

Circular Sets Forth Project De-signed to Avert Repetition of Calamity of 1847

London, Oct. 31.—The Sinn Fein or-ganization, according to the Morning Post, has started a food control depart-ment in Ireland, independent of the gov-ernment. The newspaper prints the text of a circular, which it says is being distributed widely, asking priests to help in making an inventory of food stocks as an initial step towards "retaining in Ireland sufficient food for the entire population and arranging to have it available for distribution whenever famine is to be dreaded."

C. P. R. AGAIN WAS

UNDER PRESSURE

New York, Oct. 31.—(Wall street)—United States Steel featured the lower trend of prices at the opening of today's stock market, with a sale of 5,000 shares at 101 1/2 to 101 1/4 against yesterday's final price of 102 1/2. Later the stock fell to 101 1/4, but rallied fractionally. Cana-dian Pacific was under further pressure at a decline of 1 1/4 and Central Leather was the heaviest specialty, losing 1 1/2. The reaction embraced General Motors, shipings and Pullman at recessions of one to two and a half points.

FOR FEDERAL REGULATION

Washington, Oct. 31.—Federal regula-tion of the issuance of railway securities and additional recommendations for fur-ther railroad legislation were endorsed by the Affiliated Trade and Commercial organizations of the chamber of com-merce of the United States, in a refer-endum just concluded. The vote strongly backed up a report of the chamber's railroad committee.

TOCA FAILS TO FORM

NEW SPANISH CABINET

Madrid, Oct. 31.—Joquin Sanchez Toca, former president of the senate, last night abandoned his attempt to form a new Spanish cabinet. He was charged with the task early in the day by King Alfonso.

London, Oct. 31.—William Henry Francis Denison, second Earl of Londes-borough, died yesterday at Bourne-mouth. He was born in 1850.

OBEY THE LAW!

Report at Once for Service or Claim Exemption

Under the Military Service Act, all men in Class One are soldiers today, absent with leave and without pay. Failure to obey the law amounts to **DESERTION** and can be punished as such.

Class One includes bachelors and wid-owers without children (not otherwise excepted) who were 20 years old on the 13th of October, 1917, and whose 34th birthday did not occur before January 1st, 1917.

DO IT TODAY!

The rush in the last few days may be such that in the hurry and stress a number of men may fail to comply with the requirements under the Act. That will not be recognized as an excuse, as every man is being given ample time to report for service, or claim exemption.

GO TO YOUR POST OFFICE TODAY and ask for a form for reporting for service or for claiming exemption. Under-stand, it is a matter of **LAW** that all the men in Class One must report for service or claim exemption not later than November 10th, 1917.
