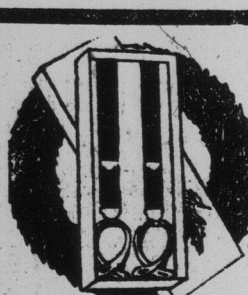

### TYPEWRITERS SINCE 1866

Millions of Dollars' Worth of Machines Produced Yearly—Invention Caused Revolution

(From the Philadelphia Telegraph.)  
A half century ago, or, to be precise, on Dec. 1, 1866, the first patent was issued for a typewriter in the United States, and among the most prized possessions of the government patent office are the documents known as United States Letters Patent No. 3163, by John Pratt, journalist and inventor.  
During these intervening years the typewriter industry has grown to such proportions that four of the great factories alone are turning out each year in the neighborhood of 100,000 machines, and, despite the war, cannot fill their orders. According to the 1910 census, there were eighty-nine factories devoted to the manufacture of typewriters and supplies, with a combined capital of \$29,806,888. Goods valued at \$20,000,000 were produced of which one-third of the total number were exported. In 1889 there were only thirty factories, with a capital of \$1,500,000 with an output of a little more than \$500,000.

The "Pterotype."  
In 1864, John Pratt and his wife went to England, where they remained for several years, he devoting his time to the invention of a mechanism, which he designated the "Pterotype." It proved to be the first working typewriter that ever secured a sale. In 1867 his machine was exhibited before the Society of Arts in London; the Society of Engineers, and the Royal Society of Great Britain.

Pratt claimed four operations as requisite to the accomplishment of his purpose; that it was necessary to bring any one of a number of types at the will of the operator and in arbitrary succession to a common point; to form a colored other legible character at that common point; to feed the paper across that common point so as to make the interlaid between the letters and words; to prepare a device for bringing the paper readily and speedily back to its starting point with an interval between the lines.

His invention received editorial mention and description in several English journals, and it was one of these descriptions which attracted an American firm and laid the foundation of one of the great plants which is turning out thousands of machines today.  
The machine was preserved as a curiosity, among the treasures of the patent office, a typewritten letter from him which accompanied his model. The spacing, alignment, etc., it is said, were perfect. Pratt was the first man to make typewriters and also to sell them. Among his first customers was the celebrated Dr. Benet Jones, author of "The Life of Faraday."

**Pratt and Sholes.**  
Pratt was the first to use compound motion, and thus use several rows of types or plates or wheels; the first to apply escapement to feed motion and a trip hammer action in a wheel or plate machine. Pratt may justly be called the grandfather of the typewriter, and Christopher Latham Sholes, the father. Pratt was also a journalist, and, like his early career was successively the editor of a number of daily papers. With a quick intuition he saw the possibilities of a revolution in the handling of the press, and from that moment devoted all his time and thought which has given to the world a machine which does its satisfactory.

Later he invented several improvements, which with an excess of characteristic conscience, he gave to persons in control of the manufacture. ### TO AID TILL ITALY WINS.

Page Tells Italians the Meaning of Our New Declaration of War.

Rome, Dec. 10.—(Delayed).—Replying to the great demonstration before the American embassy today, in recognition of the declaration of war against Austria by the United States, Ambassador Page said:  
"Why do you think that the United States, following the lead of that apostle of liberty, our great president, declared war against Austria-Hungary? We were distant; we were safe. It was to help Italy and the cause for which Italy has undergone such suffering. It is to Italy's honor and champion of liberty, in her hour of distress, that my people come as one man, pledging every resource for her relief; and be sure we will not stop until we have won. Today in our hearts there is but one question—how to aid Italy and the other great democracies which are fighting the tyranny which from its supreme stronghold in Central Europe is endeavoring to overrun and crush the world; how to win this war and make liberty secure throughout the ages for Italy and for the people of the world, great and small; how to win in the quickest and surest way."

"It is for this great end that my government has just declared war against Italy's most immediate and bitter foe, against those who would make a wilderness and call it peace."  
The ambassador continued by saying that he had every reason to believe that the people of the United States were standing behind him in his having made clear to his government the greatness of soul with which Italy had poured out her blood to withstand the overwhelming pressure of the enemy and defend her sacred soil.

### CEREALS SOLD IN SMALL PACKAGES UNDER LICENSE

Ottawa, Dec. 16.—The food controller has issued regulations governing the trade in cereals in packages of less than twenty pounds of weight. They provide that, on and after Jan. 1, no manufacturer of breakfast foods or cereals shall manufacture, for sale in Canada, or sell in Canada, such breakfast foods or cereals in original packages of less than twenty pounds without first obtaining a license from the food controller for each kind of breakfast food or cereal manufactured. License fees ranging from \$120 upwards are to be charged.

Wholesale and retail dealers will not be required to secure a license for the sale of breakfast foods or cereals manufactured under license from the food controller. The regulations prohibit the use, by manufacturers, of cereals in packages affected by the order, of coupons, premiums, prizes or other inducements to purchase. All packages must bear the name of the manufacturer, net weight and license number.

It is also ordered that the prices at which breakfast foods or cereals are sold to the public in packages shall not exceed such an amount as will pay for the cost of the containers and allow a reasonable profit on the contents of the package. The container shall, in all cases, be inexpensive.

Every applicant for a license must state the cost per pound or per package to the manufacturer of the container, and of the advertising and selling of such breakfast food or cereal and if, in the opinion of the food controller, such cost is excessive, he may refuse to issue a license.

Licenses for the manufacture of any breakfast food or cereal which is composed in whole or in part of wheat flour or any product of wheat are subject to cancellation by the food controller upon one month's notice if, in his opinion, it is desirable to conserve the wheat or product of wheat so used. The food controller may, however, if he considers it in the public interest, permit such manufacturer to substitute any other flour or material in the manufacture of such breakfast food or cereal in place of wheat flour or product of wheat.

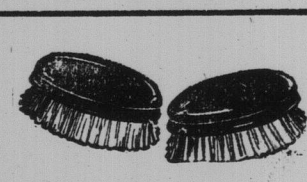
