LAST NIGHT'S WAR CABLES

A reverse of the Allies along the river Aisne, in the neighborhood of Solsona, is admitted in the latest French official statement, although the possible effect of the German advance is officially minimized.

After continuous engagements, which lasted nearly two days, the Germans forced the French to yield in front of Vegny, to the east of Coucy. It is explained by the French war office that the flooding of the river Aisne destroyed several of the bridges, and thus rendered precarious the communications of the troops operating on the right bank. These troops were withdrawn, as it was thought impossible to send reinforcements to their support.

"The success is a partial one for our adversaries," says the French statement, "but will have no influence on the operations as a whole."

Emperor William himself was present at these operations, which resulted in the capture of several thousand French prisoners, and were continued throughout January 12 and 13.

Petrograd claims that the Russian troops have progressed on the right bank of the lower Vistula, where the German cavalry was repulsed. On the other front the fighting is made up largely of skirmishes and artillery duels.

The general staff of the Caucasus army deposes a statement to the operations in Azerbaijan, it is explained, it became expedient to re-group the Russian forces, necessitating the evacuation of certain places previously occupied. No important action took place, only an engagement by the Russian advance guard.

British aviators, early in the week, dropped bombs on the German position in Antwerp, according to a Netherlands newspaper despatch. The damage done by the bombs has not been ascertained.

Geneva reports that members of the Austrian nobility and aristocracy and Viennese financiers are depositing large sums of money in Switzerland, and also giving orders for the purchase of quantities of American securities.

The American secretary of state has acknowledged, in a friendly specific receipt of the preliminary reply of the British government to the American note protesting against the treatment accorded neutral commerce by the British warships. No comment is made by the secretary in view of the fact that it is Great Britain's intention to reply later in detail.

Maritime Province Conditions

In the Canadian Bank of Commerce Review of conditions for 1914, D. Macgillivray, manager at Halifax, writes: "The value of the agricultural products of Nova Scotia for the last year was estimated at \$21,000,000. On the outbreak of the war the premier of the province addressed a letter to the farmers pointing out the opportunity for increased agricultural production and the important services which would thereby be rendered to the nation in the present crisis. This appeal has met with a good response, and we look for a further substantial increase of probably 15 to 20 per cent. in the cultivated acreage next year. The Agricultural College at Truro continues in a high state of efficiency and is doing invaluable service to the farmers."

"The total lumber cut in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick in 1914 was approximately 1,000,000 cubic feet, but the total shipments were larger. The total trade in goods was estimated at 400,000,000 feet, and prices averaged \$16.75 per thousand feet, ranging from \$14.50 to \$19, the latter being the outside high price for a good specification. This return is better than that obtained in average years, and is \$2.50 per thousand above the level of 1912. Owing to the shutting off of the Baltic supplies on account of the war, the market in England for our lumber is present time very firm and is almost certain to continue so, at least through the first half of 1915. Our exportation therefore is that a larger cut in goods than usual will be made this winter. The American market, excepting in April and May, was satisfactory at no time during the year, but the local trade kept up very well until the last of August. Throughout 1914, especially in connection with the large public works in progress, we expect the local demand will be very fair. All the manufactured stock of 1914 has been well cleaned up and the industry is in a sound position. The usual quantity of machinery has been manufactured and produced fair profits, but the English market is at present extremely depressed and the immediate outlook not bright. There is some prospect of a trade in pit props, but as the price which the mine owners of Great Britain have been paying for European supplies delivered is about the same as the minimum price at which our people can afford to sell them (F. C. B. Halifax, we do not look for any considerable business in this line during the year."

Excepting in the two or three principal industrial centres, general mercantile trade is not far below an average, and the number of failures has not materially increased. Slackness in building has been reflected in the hardware trade and in brickyards. The prevalence of bargain sales, especially in dry goods, would indicate a dull autumn trade, but the very fine weather. On the other hand, the wholesale trade in dry goods and groceries has been well up to the level of 1913.

"The decrease of 10 per cent. in customs returns and of 25 per cent. in the earnings of the Intercolonial Railway in a measure reflect the recession in trade. The unemployment figures are due partly to the closing of the stock markets and the practical stoppage of all investment business."

"The crisis at the outbreak of the war was calmly faced by the business community. Endeavouring to meet the needs of the war, the king goes everywhere among the soldiers and speaks to the men and officers in such a kind way that the public impression of him has entirely changed since the war began.
