

## TWO C.N.R. MEN WIN PROMOTION HERE

W. N. Collins and Thomas F. Donovan Are Advanced.

Two promotions for members of the local C. N. R. staff were announced this morning by C. S. Pushe, local terminal agent. One of those promoted is William Norman Collins to the position of general freight foreman of all C. N. R. sheds in St. John. The other is Thomas F. Donovan, advanced to the position of shed foreman. Both of these appointments will be effective tomorrow.

Mr. Collins, who is the eldest son of John Collins, who for many years guided the public at the gates in the Union Depot, entered the C. N. R. service as a messenger in January, 1900. He held during the ensuing years the following positions: Freight messenger, freight porter, freight checker, freight foreman, agent for G. T. R. and C. G. R. at West St. John, then at Long wharf, where he has been wharfing and foreman of piers since June 1916. Now comes the present promotion which gives him supervision over the handling of all freight at St. John. His many friends will be glad to hear of his well merited advancement.

Mr. Donovan is the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Daniel Donovan. He entered the C. N. R. service in 1904 and has risen steadily by hard work. He will be under Mr. Collins as shed foreman.

### GETTING READY TO APPLY.

The solicitor of the New Brunswick Electric Power Commission is now engaged in drawing up the application to the International Joint Commission for permission to create storage on the international waters of the St. John, it was said this morning at the office of the commission. H. G. Acres, consulting engineer, will be here about Nov. 26 to go over the plans and application before they are submitted to the International Commission.

### HON. DR. PUGSLEY IN CITY.

Hon. Dr. Pugsley returned this afternoon from Ottawa, where he has been hearing war claims against Germany for sums totalling more than \$1,000,000, brought by the British American and Western Assurance companies. Dr. Pugsley said this afternoon that he expected to be home about a week, after which he would return to Ottawa prior to a tour of western cities ending at Vancouver and Victoria.

### MILITARY INSPECTION.

Col. W. B. Anderson, C. M. G., D. S. O., commanding M. D. No. 7, and Lt.-Col. H. C. Sperling, D. S. O., returned today from Moncton, where they inspected the 8th Battery, under Captain C. W. Smallwood, and No. 2 Company, 7th Machine Gun Battalion, under Lieut. L. T. Tingley. The units passed the tests in satisfactory manner. Tonight at the Armoury, the commanding officer will inspect the 3rd N. B. Heavy Brigade.

### COUNTY WORK.

A meeting of the finance committee of the Municipal Council has been called for next Monday afternoon at 2:30. Among the matters to be taken up are a request from the Lunenburg Highway Board for authority to issue bonds for a retaining wall in Union Point road, the estimated cost of which is about \$14,000, and a request from the Simons/Sewerage Board for authority to construct a sewer from the Red Head road to the Foley property, about 750 feet. The sewer would be carried at the rear of the first tier of lots on Westmorland road, and the estimated cost is about \$2,000.

### SUGGESTS GET-TOGETHER.

The councillors of the various parishes are in receipt of a letter from the office of the county secretary, in which that official sets out the importance of the assessment list and the necessity for having it correct. He says the practice of changing assessors has had effect on the list and that it is impossible to make a new assessment in the time allowed by law. The letter suggests that the councillors get together before the January meeting to discuss this important matter and agree on their appointees for assessors for the coming year.

## WILL HAVE TWO LINES FROM HERE

C. G. M. Plans for Winter at St. John are Announced.

Two steamship services will be operated out of St. John this season by the C. G. M. M. It was learned this afternoon from R. T. Armstrong, travelling C. G. M. M. agent who arrived in the city this afternoon. The two services will be to London and Antwerp and to Cardiff and Swansea. The staff will arrive from Montreal to open the local office within ten days.

The latest schedule calls for five sailings from this port during December, three on the London-Antwerp service and two on the Cardiff-Swansea line. The Canadian Explorer will leave here in the London service on Dec. 8 to be followed by the Canadian Commander and Canadian Pioneer. The Canadian Leader will sail about the same time for Cardiff and she will be followed by the Canadian Master.

Mr. Armstrong, who formerly was attached to the staff here but who last winter was transferred permanently to headquarters at Montreal, although his business often brings him here during the winter season, said this afternoon that the C. G. M. M. service from this port would be about the same as last season. There were no new services being contemplated from this port for the coming season.

## Clydeside Tenants, Evicted In Morning, Are Back Again In Homes By Night

London, Nov. 14.—(British United Press, by H. Bailey)—On the Clyde-side some real bright little comedies are being played daily. Tenants who refuse to pay their rent are evicted early in the morning and the doors of their houses are solemnly closed and sealed. Yet the tenant returns at night, because of the activities of the Tenants' Defence League, which enables the evicted ones to go back. Actual legal proceedings against the League as house breakers are being seriously contemplated by the landlords. The police fear that if they have to support the landlords in these evictions there will be a serious violence, for the temper of the people is extremely ugly.

## UNCONSCIOUS NEAR HIS BURNING BARN

James Beckwith Recovering Today—Cow, Horses and Hay Lost.

Complete loss of a barn, a cow, two horses and about 40 tons of hay was caused by fire which broke out about 7:30 o'clock last evening in the barn of James Beckwith. Hickey Road, about seven miles out of the city. In endeavoring to get the animals out of the burning structure, Mr. Beckwith was partially suffocated by smoke and when neighbors arrived on the scene to lend help, he was found unconscious near the barn.

There was very little wind and because of this, the workers were enabled to save the dwelling house which stands nearby. Mr. Beckwith was reported this morning to be much improved.

## MAKE MOVE TO STOP RUM-RUNNING HERE

Eastern Provinces Consider Urging Federal Govt. to Stop Smuggling.

Fredericton, Nov. 14.—The Provinces of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia are to seek the co-operation of Quebec and Prince Edward Island in urging the Dominion Government to suppress liquor smuggling along the Atlantic coast of Canada.

It is with the object of stopping the flow of smuggled liquor into the Maritime Provinces and Quebec that the Dominion Government is to be asked to take vigorous means to suppress the operations.

The first steps towards the conference have been taken by the Nova Scotia Government. Chairman W. R. Wakely of the N. S. Liquor Commission invited Hon. J. P. Tweeddale, chairman of the N. B. Liquor Commission, to confer with him.

They met in St. John and Hon. Mr. Tweeddale confirmed reports that the object of his visit had been to confer with Mr. Wakely regarding a plan of action.

## Jersey City Block Wrecked By Fire

Jersey City, N. J., Nov. 14.—An entire city block, occupied by two factories and two rows of tenement houses was a roaring furnace at 11 a. m. today in a fire which started in the Richardson Chemical Company salt petre plant, leaped through dozens of streams of water and beyond human control, while explosions blew out walls and roof of the plant, broke windows in a half mile area, spread terror among residents and forced into the huge American Sugar Refinery plant. Over a dozen firemen were overcome by fumes and scores of people were treated for cuts from flying glass and effects of the fumes which rolled across the city and the Hudson River.

Kerr, when balloting concluded last night, had 5,230, while Nelson was standing at 5,140. Another South End League player, "Jack" Dalton, was running in third place with 4,400, while Charlie Gorman was fourth with 3,060. Unless other competitors make sensational gains tonight, the race for honors will be between this quartette, as fifth position is held by Walter Bartlett, Trojans, with 740 votes. The remainder of the standing is as follows: Moran, 600; Johnny Butler, 420; Devine, 350; J. Corrigan, 230; Fitzgerald and Sherwood, 180; "Bunker" Murphy, 170; "Jack" O'Toole and Harry Daley, 160; Ira Hannah, 140. Kerr wins a prize for heading the list last night. The showing being made by Earl Nelson, the colored boy, is arousing considerable interest. There has little talk of Nelson when the contest opened, but he has steadily kept in the race.
