With the closing of the British Empire Exhibition at Wembley a large number of cats, hundreds of them, which had taken up their abode in various pavilions, stalls and kiosks, suddenly found that their world was coming to an end, and that they had no abiding city. But they had friends in need who soon came to their assistance. That excellent institution known as "Our Dumb Friends' League" had foreseen the peril that was threatening the feline population of Wembley. The league sent its motor collecting van, which made a tour of the exhibition, and willing helpers took part in rounding up and capturing the disconsolate stragglers, which were wandering bewildered about the grounds as the work of dismantling and packing proceeded. Many of the cats, it is said, preferred to take their future in their own hands, and scurried over the walls in quest of adventures. The animals removed by Our Dumb Friends' League, it should be explained, were not destined for the lethal chamber, but are being cared for until good homes can be found for them. The league has already received numerous requests from the public for a Wembley cat, an ornament to any patriotic fireside.

### Enter College With View To Matrimony

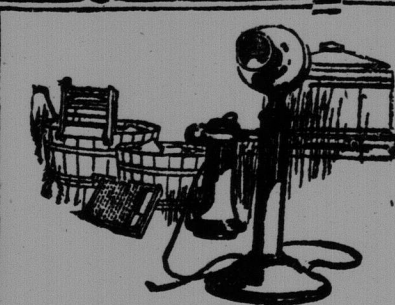
