MR. WILSON AND JOSEPH TUMULTY

(Mail and Enquire)
Most of the biographical sketches of
Mr. Wilson published since he returned
to private life have been hostile. Some
of them have been cruel. Now comes
Joseph Tumulty, his private secretary
throughout his term of office, to the de-
struction of his leader in a series of articles
which are to be published in the New
York Times. They promise to be ex-
tremely interesting, although it is not
likely that they will be accepted on their
face value. Mr. Tumulty being an un-
assuming partisan of Mr. Wilson's.
Nevertheless, he was in a position to
know things unknown to anyone else
concerning the former president. As to
his own relations with Mr. Wilson we
gather a hint of their intimacy from the
fact that the latter, after having offered
the position of Secretary of War in his
first cabinet to Mr. Palmer, who de-
clined on the ground that he was a Quaker,
if he had any suggestions to make. After
a brief period of reflection, the secre-
tary suggested Lindley M. Garrison, who
was appointed, greatly to the astonish-
ment, for he had never sought an office
and was personally unknown to Mr.
Wilson, and known only slightly by Mr.
Tumulty.

Clash With Roosevelt.
The first instalment of the memoirs
concerns the President's relations with
Theodore Roosevelt. Gen. Leonard Wood
and William F. McComb. When the

United States entered the war, Colonel
Roosevelt asked permission to raise and
equip a great volunteer force and lead
it to France. This was denied him and
the incident made a great rumour at
the time, the friends of the Colonel
insisting that the president was trying
to prevent his rival from gaining any
credit out of the war.

Describes the meetings the President had
with his predecessors when the Wood
was under discussion. Says that they
were of the friendliest character.
Indeed, he says that Wilson was a great
admirer of Roosevelt's, and Roosevelt
of Wilson's.

"He is a great, big boy. I was, as for-
merly, charmed by his personality. There
is a sweetness about him that is very
compelling. You can't resist the man."

The Slight to Wood.
The reason the permission was not
granted to Colonel Roosevelt was that
the Administration realized that the war
had to be fought by professionals, with
complete authority over subordinate
volunteer commanders, no matter how
great their valor, how pure their mo-
tives, or how eminent their positions in
the nation. To make an exception of
Col. Roosevelt would have been to strike
at the heart of the whole design. This
is the explanation of Mr. Tumulty, who
says that it was the President's strong
personal wish that the matter might have
been otherwise arranged. The Wood in-
cident created even greater feeling. The
general had trained his division and on
the eve of his departure to France he
had been ordered to remain behind. This
was a great blow to him and enraged the
Republican press.

Blames Pershing.
Again it was asserted that Wood be-
cause he was an intimate friend of
Roosevelt's and a prominent Republican,
was, for political reasons, being cheated
of an opportunity to lead an expedition
to the front. Mr. Tumulty's explanation
is that Wood was kept at home because
Pershing did not want him overseas. He
did not ask for Wood. His retention in the United States
was considered merely a matter of army
routine when the decision was reached,
but the hubbub is produced because Tu-
multy, always a shrewd politician, to
urge the President to intervene and send
Wood either to France or to Italy. He
pointed out that the Administration was
being unfairly condemned for the criti-
cism of the country. I do not intend to
embarrass Gen. Pershing by forcing his
hand."

The McComb Incident.
The chapter devoted to Mr. McComb
was written, no doubt, as an answer to
recent articles published by friends of
Mr. McComb's, who died some little time
ago, but left behind him a manuscript con-
cerning his association with Mr. Wilson.
McComb was his campaign manager
when Mr. Wilson was first elected Presi-
dent. It is believed that McComb, Col.
Harvey, and Henry Watkinson were
primarily responsible for Mr. Wilson
entering politics. Harvey became one of
his bitterest enemies.
