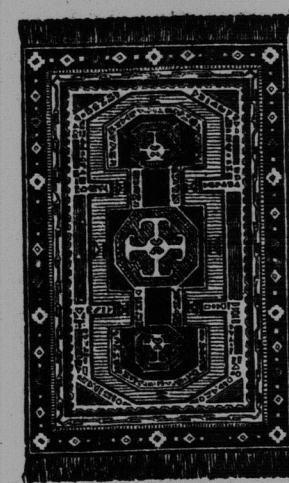

LOCAL NEWS

Commissioner Jones accompanied by S. A. Sewell, superintendent of water, yesterday visited the eastern watershed from which the city proper receives its water supply. Mr. Jones said he saw no indication of hoisting or bathing in any of the lakes. He said the water was down about six inches below normal level. He also intimated that the matter of water pollution would probably be brought up in council next week.

The attendance at the Rural Summer School of Science in Sussex is expected to reach a record. The school will open next week under the direction of A. C. Gorham, M. Sc., and will continue for four weeks. Other instructors at the camp will be Prof. Frank Wheelock of Acadia University, who will lecture on practical physics, and O. Hicks of the agricultural department, who will give instructions in cereals, soils and general farm chemistry. William McIntosh, M. Sc., of this city, will lecture on animal life and nature study.

CANADIAN RAILWAY WAGES MATTER
Montreal, July 9—Canadian Railway executives yesterday concluded their conference on wages and working conditions. It was announced that no statement would be issued at present.
