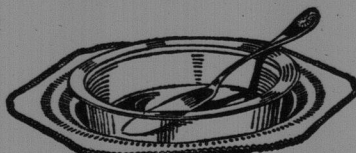

Miss Georgina Jett died in Fredericton on Saturday, aged seventy-four years. She leaves one brother and one sister.

The death of Mrs. Margaret Mather, widow of Lawrence Mather, occurred on Friday in Newcastle. She was ninety-four years of age and leaves four sons and daughters, twenty-eight grandchildren and twenty-nine great-grandchildren.

Miss Hilda Caroline Palmer died yesterday in the General Public Hospital after an illness with typhoid fever, which she contracted while teaching at Beaver Harbor. She is survived by her parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. I. Palmer, two sisters, Ida Pearl and Verna Marguerite, and two brothers, Fred S. and Archie, all at home. They have the sympathy of many friends.

Adam E. Farquhar, J. P., died on Saturday in Truro. He was manager of the Truro Market, Ltd. He leaves his wife and four children.

#### LOCAL NEWS

The motor truck of J. A. Jeffries, Millidge avenue, was badly damaged Saturday night as a result of fire.

In St. John's (Stone) church yesterday morning, Rev. Canon Kuhring delivered a sermon on "Israel's Restoration" or the return of the Jews to Palestine.

In the police court on Saturday afternoon the James Pender Company case was settled, the company agreeing to get a registered engineer to look after the second unit of the steam plant.

In a stirring address in the Main street Baptist church, Rev. Dr. David Hutchinson last night denounced bootlegging as the "meanest of all occupations next to the white slave traffic."

Rev. D. H. Loweth was elected president and Ernest L. Jack secretary of the Camera Club in connection with the Art Club. Meetings will be held on first and third Thursdays.

The chief of the fire department received a check for \$25 for the Firemen's Relief Association from A. McArthur, Main street, in recognition of valuable services rendered on last Wednesday night.

Alfred Powers, a young lad living in Main street, was struck by an automobile near his home yesterday and had his arm broken and was otherwise bruised. After being attended to by Dr. H. C. Clark he was taken to the General Public Hospital.

The collector of customs on Saturday received a wire from Ottawa saying that the general licenses for the export of coal had been cancelled. License for each shipment, including the bunkering of vessels, will be required for all vessels sailing from this country.

An alarm from box 123 yesterday afternoon called the fire department out to extinguish a fire in the woodshed of E. D. Starkey in Main street. The damage was slight. On the way to the fire one of the horses, No. 3 horse fell and was so seriously injured that it was destroyed.

The Badminton Club of St. John's Stone church held a supper Saturday evening in the Sunday school at which Rev. Canon Kuhring, honorary president, and Mrs. Kuhring and W. K. Ganong, the president, were present. The supper was arranged by a committee with Miss Grace Estey and Miss Marion Dearborn as conveners.

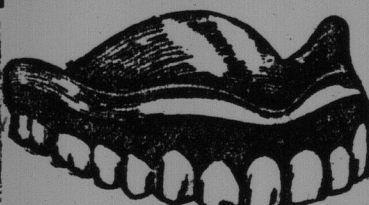

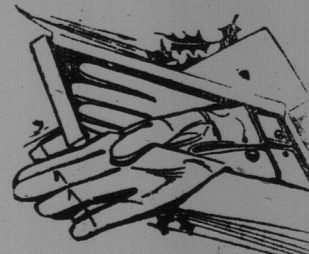
