"DAGO MIKE" IS ARRESTED AGAIN

Chicago Police Take Him in
Connection with Shooting
of Enright.

Chicago, Feb. 10.—Disclosures made
yesterday by Ralph Buglio, owner of an
automobile identified as the machine
from which Maurice Moss Enright, labor
feudist and gunman, was shot to death,
led to the arrest of "Dago Mike" Car-
rezo, president of the Street Sweepers'
Union.

Carrezo was released on last Saturday
in \$10,000 bond after he had been held
five days in connection with the shoot-
ing. Carrezo's apartment was searched
by detectives, who found a shotgun,
a box, for \$2.50, trial size, 281.

NO MORE FOR THESE TEACHERS

Montreal Catholic School In-
structors Before Board of
Commissioners.

Montreal, Feb. 10.—A delegation of
Catholic school teachers waited upon the
Catholic board of school commissioners
yesterday to make an appeal for the bal-
ance of \$40 increase in salary which was
asked for in last September. Ten thou-
sand signatures were shown on a peti-
tion for this.
Judge Lafontaine, chairman of the
board, told the delegation "we have done
all that we can do up to the last cent,
and we can do no more. We have said that
he and other members of the board
sympathized with the teachers but of-
fered no immediate solution of their
financial problems.

dian headquarters in Toronto, effective
in April.

INSURANCE AGENT ENDS HIS LIFE

Toronto Man Gets Permis-
sion to Carry Revolver,
Then Shoots Himself.

Toronto, Feb. 10.—H. P. Strickland, in-
surance agent, yesterday obtained per-
mission from the chief of police to carry
a revolver because of the numerous
hold-ups in Toronto. He bought a re-
volver in the afternoon and last evening
he shot and killed himself opposite St.
Michael's Hospital. An inquest will be
held.

QUEBEC HOUSE

Important Bills, One Amend-
ing Provisions of Work-
men's Compensation Act.

(Canadian Press).
Quebec, Feb. 10.—Important bills were
put through the legislative assembly
yesterday while others were advanced.
Among them was one to make it legal
for any municipality to grant tax ex-
emptions to industrial and commercial
establishments.
The attorney general presented one
that enacts that after a third offence
disorderly houses shall be closed for
twelve months. The minister of public
works presented amendments to the
workmen's compensation act. Under
which the maximum salary within which
a man may be classed as a workman is
increased from \$1,200 to \$15,000 per an-
num and raises total compensation from
\$2,200 to \$3,000.
The house in committee of the whole
passed resolutions of the Hon. Walter
Mitchell, provincial treasurer, authorizing
the government to borrow \$10,000,000
under the good roads act, to supplement
the \$20,000,000 already spent.
One bill brought forth criticism from
Hon. Mr. Sauve, leader of the opposition,
that the government was more concern-
ed in increasing the salaries of highly
paid employees than in thinking of the
low paid men.

NEW JERSEY FIGHT FOR A P. C. BEER

Trenton, N. J., Feb. 10.—The opening
gun in a battle to give New Jersey four
per cent beer were fired here yesterday
at a joint legislative hearing. In sup-
port Governor Edwards, sponsors of the
bill, Attorney Gen. McCran offered an
opinion that New Jersey was entirely
within its rights in passing an act de-
fining "intoxicating liquors" at a higher
percentage than provided by the Vol-
stead act.
W. B. Wheeler, general counsel for the
anti saloon league, who led the prohibi-
tion forces, contended that no state can
legalize what the laws of the United
States prohibit.

LAMONT ON MISSION TO THE FAR EAST.

New York, Feb. 10.—Thomas W. Lam-
ont of J. P. Morgan & Co. will leave
on next Thursday for the Far East as
the representative of an American group
of bankers who are part of the Chinese
consortium organized by the banking
group in the United States, Great Brit-
ain, France and Japan, to assist the
Chinese republic in her public enter-
prises.

BROKE IN TWO.

New York, Feb. 9.—Forty-four mem-
bers of the crew of the steamship
Princess Anne, which has been ashore
at Rockaway Point, Long Island, since
Thursday, were taken off today by
coast guards in surf boats. The rest
of the crew, twenty-eight men and
thirty-two passengers, were removed on
Saturday.
After the crew had been removed the
vessel broke in two in a smooth sea.
The bar on which she had been driven
by the storm last week.
Charles F. Barker first mate, said that
he had used his revolver last night to
prevent some of the crew from trying
to leave the ship. Four shots in the air
he explained made the rebellious men
obey orders. Captain Seay was taken
off on Saturday because of injuries.
