## LOCAL NEWS

**INSPECTOR ILL.**  
Inspector Merryfield, of Chief Inspector Wilson's staff, is confined to his home today by illness.

**EARLY SESSION.**  
It was announced this morning by Magistrate Ritchie that the police court would be held at nine o'clock on Saturday mornings during the summer months.

**THE PUBLIC HEALTH.**  
The Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council has approved of certain additional regulations to be added to The Public Health Act of 1918. These regulations name a large number of diseases as considered contagious and are to be enforceable by board of health in order that precautionary measures may be taken.

**THE EMPRESS.**  
The C. P. R. steamer Empress arrived here last evening from Halifax via Digby, after having undergone considerable repairs. While en route here she called at Digby and brought across the bay a large quantity of freight and some passengers. This morning she started on her regular schedule and took away a large cargo of freight and a good-sized passenger list.

**FIRE AT GRAND BAY.**  
Thomas Shuter at Grand Bay, a two story wooden building, was destroyed by fire yesterday afternoon about five o'clock. Most of the family were out at the time, only one daughter being at home. Nearly everything in the house furnishings were destroyed, but the fire did not spread to the main house. Mr. Shuter is an employee of the Thompson Manufacturing Co. It is understood he carried no insurance.

**FOR THE "DOWN AND OUTS."**  
During the session of the police court this morning, Magistrate Ritchie made an appeal to the spectators in the court for small contributions, if not more than ten, fifteen or twenty cents, for the "Down and Out Fund," or as he said it had been called, the "Ritchie Fund." It was for the purpose of sending unfortunate persons to their homes. Several instances have been cited where the fund has been a benefit.

**TO INSPECT NEW SUBURB.**  
Commissioner Bullock has invited the other members of the common council to accompany him to Lancaster this afternoon to look over the home building area which is being laid out there, according to the town planning commission's scheme. The city's new suburb possesses strong attractions for those seeking building lots, and the commissioner of lands who are looking for an opportunity to erect homes of their own.

**JACK REDFERN IN CHARGE.**  
The new bath houses and swimming scows at Marble Cove are to be opened next Monday. They are to be in charge of Jack Redfern, who is an excellent swimmer and instructor, and who has had considerable experience in this line. In 1914 he was in charge of the scows in West St. John, but resigned and enlisted in the first Canadian contingent, and only recently received his discharge. While in the army he was engaged as a physical instructor and trainer. The scows last year were patronized by hundreds of people, young and old, and the opening will be awaited with no small degree of interest.

**AUTOMOBILE CASE.**  
Dr. J. A. McCourt was reported by Policemen Killen and Corner for exceeding the speed limit in the city. He said that when signalled to stop he did so, and explained that he was not aware of the speed he was going. He was fined \$10.

Edward Kearns, reported for refusing to obey the sign of a traffic policeman at the corner of Sydney and Union streets. He is a mail driver between the city and St. Martins.

There is a report against Harry H. Rouse, Price Bros., James J. Jeffries and Wallace Stevens operating their automobiles without a city license. None appeared in court. It was explained that Price Bros. and Jeffries have since taken out licenses.

## CHIEF INSPECTOR VISITS DISPENSARIES

Rev. Mr. Wilson Speaks of Ontario System, Which May be Introduced Here

Rev. W. D. Wilson, chief inspector, returned yesterday from Toronto. While there he visited the Ontario government dispensaries, operating under the new system enacted in that province which is that all liquors both wholesale and retail are handled exclusively by the government and high prices for liquor for medicine overborne.

The inspector said that he made three visits to the dispensaries in Toronto and that they were doing as he termed it, "a rushing business." On the first day they opened in one dispensary \$5,000 worth of business was done and in another \$1,000 worth. In two days of from three to four hours each, it is reckoned that from 1,400 to 1,600 customers bought liquor in these places. The inspector says that this is only the amount of business done in the retail places. No estimate was given as to the business done in the wholesale dispensaries. One of the chief advantages of the new system, he said, is that one price prevails throughout the province and prices are comparatively low. The dispensaries are selling Hennessey's One Star brandy at \$1.25 an imperial quart and Irish whiskey at the same price. They also handle all kinds of Canadian whiskeys, which are sold at \$1.85 an imperial quart and \$1.25 a reported quart. The inspector said that an act of similar nature had been passed in this province, also that all licenses have been issued for only six months. The inference is that the system now in force in Ontario will probably be in force in New Brunswick.

## FOUND SOME 65 EMPTY LEMON EXTRACT BOTTLES

Detectives Tell of Visit to Langford Coram's House

Four Men Placed Under Arrest—Three Bottles Found in Coram's Pocket—A North End Case and Others

In the police court today Langford Coram pleaded guilty to being drunk. He also is charged with keeping a disorderly house on the corner of Canterbury and St. James streets, and pleaded not guilty. Thomas Murray, Joseph Riley and James Coyle, were charged with being frequenters of this house. Detective Biddiscombe said that last night about 5:30 he and Detective Donahue went to the corner of St. James and Canterbury streets, in consequence of complaints received. They then went to Prince William street, where they saw a man coming out of a beer shop apparently under the influence of liquor. They arrested him and found it was Coram. They found three bottles of lemon extract in his pocket. While waiting around the corner of St. James and Canterbury streets they heard loud talking in the defendant's residence. They took the defendant to the police station and with Sergeant-Detective Power, again proceeded to the place. Biddiscombe went through a window and says he saw Murray on a couch, drunk and they found Riley and Coyle lying across a bed under the influence of liquor. They found about sixty-five empty lemon extract bottles. Detective Biddiscombe said that Coram's wife left his home about a week ago and since then he had been keeping this house. Sergeant-Detective Power and Detective Donahue gave corroborative evidence.

The magistrates told the defendants that they were liable to imprisonment of nine months without a fine and also that they were liable to a fine of \$100. The case was postponed.

Coyle is about seventy years of age and is from Woodstock. The magistrates said that arrangements were being made to have him examined by a doctor as he appeared to be ill and that eventually he would be sent back to Woodstock to be put in a home, as he is very feeble.

**North End Case.** McKenney, charged with having liquor in his possession illegally was remanded. Inspector McKee said that he and Inspectors Merryfield and Linton and Policemen Gibbs, went to the residence of the defendant in Adelaide street, which was the wind flat in a three tenement house. Merryfield found two bottles of liquor and three casks full of bottles containing liquor. Inspector Linton also testified.

Mrs. Fred W. Day of Main street said that on last Saturday afternoon a quantity of liquor was delivered to her husband in the kitchen by the defendant, whose voice she recognized. She said she took the liquor and gave it to Inspector Merryfield. After the search by the inspectors the defendant came to their house and asked Mr. Day to go with him till they saw a lawyer. Mrs. Day also said that the defendant told her husband that if he was fined he would pay the fine.

The case was postponed until Mr. Day and Inspector Merryfield could be in court to give evidence. They are now unwell. J. Starr Tait appeared for the prosecution while J. A. Barry appeared for the defendant.

The case against John Hayes, charged with assaulting Sheriff Wilton in court recently, was resumed. By request of the defendant's counsel, Daniel Mullin, K. C., who is as of yet, the case was postponed until Tuesday. The defendant was remanded to jail.

The case of Wallace Stevens charged with having liquor in his possession illegally and with interfering with the liquor inspectors in the discharge of their duty, was postponed until Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock. E. S. Ritchie appeared for the defendant.

One man was charged with drunkenness. He said he bought a bottle of gin and he did not know the seller. He was remanded.

In the probate court, Judge McInerney presiding, letters of administration have been granted to J. Roy Campbell in the matter of the estate of J. K. Percy. There was no real estate and personality was not in excess of \$1,000. R. A. Davidson is proctor.

In the matter of the estate of Daniel J. Doyle, letters of testamentary were granted to his son, D. J. Doyle, and daughter, Mrs. Alice M. Burns. He left no real estate, and his personality was valued at \$1,200. C. H. Ferguson is proctor.

Letters testamentary were granted to A. P. Barnhill as executor, in the matter of the estate of Jane Matilda Gaul, widow. There was no real estate. The personality was valued at \$600. C. F. Sanford is proctor.

**FOR BRIDES-TO-BE.**
