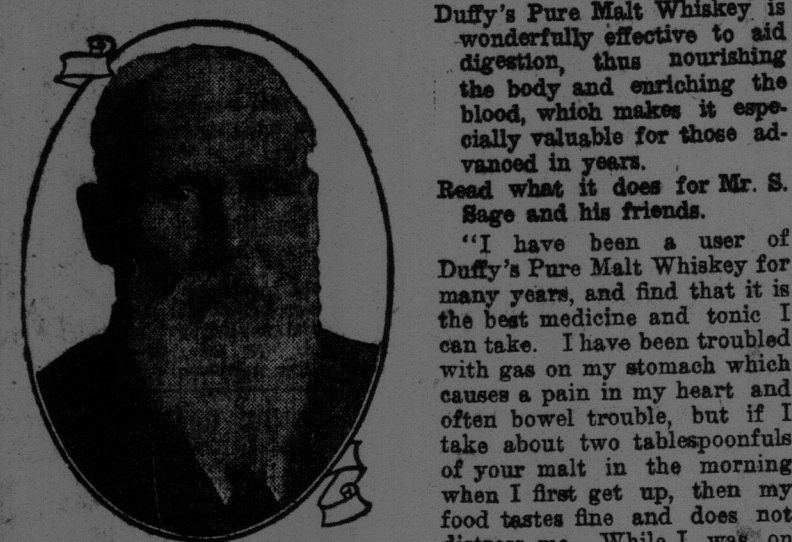

### GIVES HALIFAX A BOOST

Montreal Interview Predicts All Kinds of Things Including C. N. R. Acquiring Intercolonial

(Montreal Herald.)

The eventual acquiring of the Intercolonial Railway by the Canadian Northern following the start of the dominion government's \$35,000,000 job on railway terminals at that port, was predicted by a Halifax man at the Windsor Hotel this morning.

This gentleman, who has been spending most of his time in Ottawa and Montreal during the last two months, in connection with Halifax deals, also said that a Halifax delegation was now in England working on a big dry dock proposition. The dominion government was reported to be back of this scheme, and enquiries which he had received from ministers whom he had occasion to see in Ottawa had led him to believe that they were seeking all available information as to possible dock sites, of which there are four. One of these is at the present government dock site on the city side of the harbor, another at Dartmouth Cove, another on the Eastern Passage southeast of Fort Clarence, and another on a cove north of Dartmouth Cove and on the same side.

The work of building the new I. C. R. line around the peninsula on which the city stands to a point a mile and a half from the present dock is already under way. In May, 1,000 additional men will be put on the job. Docks and all, this project will take three or four years in completion.

The probability of the C. N. R.'s activities in Halifax and throughout the maritime provinces has confirmation in the establishment in Halifax of the J. C. Carleton Company, which has been largely identified with C. N. R. deals in the west. During the last two months, also, Sir William Mackenzie has been closely in conference at Ottawa with Hector McInnes, a very prominent man in the Nova Scotia capital. The scale of the C. N. R.'s transcontinental operations, those past and those hanging on Sir William Mackenzie's present excursion to England, it is believed, must carry an Atlantic winter port in their train as an absolute necessity.

Lorne McMillan and associates have invested a million in Halifax and residential sites, and the action of Montreal railway promoters in acquiring the Halifax street railway is looked upon as another indication that financial bodies have some information which point to developments on which the government's big expenditure will only be a pittance.

The government plans have thrown the Garrison City into real estate turmoil. Many fine old residences have had to give way, including that of Senator McKeen, whose front door is almost closed by the new line's right of way.

The new tramways interests have laid plans with care. P. B. McCurdy, M. P., finding it impossible to have his water power transported to Halifax, owing to the local laws of country in which the producing property is situated, has managed to have Sir Frederick Borden allied with the Montreal interests, and the late minister's Gaspeaux power will be used. A big western real estate operator and who has been investigating the city recently, has perpetrated the saying that "when Halifax wakes up it will be worse than the rejuvenation of Aunt Mary." He has since invested largely.

### Daily Hints For the Cook

**SPONGE DROPS.**

Three eggs, beaten separately, 1/2 cup sugar, 1 heaping cup flour, 1 heaping teaspoon baking powder, 1 teaspoon flavoring. Drop by teaspoon 3 inches apart to allow them to spread. Bake quickly.

**JOHNNY CAKE.**

One cup Indian meal, one cup flour 1 1/2 cups milk, two eggs, 1/4 cup sugar, one even teaspoon salt, two tablespoons melted butter, two rounding teaspoons baking powder. Bake in muffin rings or loaf.

**APPLE MERINGUE.**

Pare and core six large apples (sweet apples) and bake until tender; pile them on a deep dish; take the whites of three eggs and beat to a stiff froth, cover the apples with same and brown in oven. Beat the yolks and stir into a pint of milk, scald until it thickens; cool and flavor to taste; pour around the apples in dish and dot with jelly.
