MORNING NEWS OVER THE WIRES
The Federal Government had completed the purchase of the Carquet and Gulf Shore Railway and with the exception of \$800 the purchase price had been paid. Hon. P. Graham, Acting Minister of Railways and Canada, made the announcement in the House yesterday and added that the \$800 was held in obedience to protect the claim of the Post Office Department against the railway.

BOSCAWAN TO TRY IN SURREY
Member Resigns and Minister Will Seek to Win the Place.
London, Feb. 13.—(Canadian Press)—Dr. T. C. Worsfold, Conservative, M. P., for the Mitcham division of Surrey, is giving up his seat and has applied for the Chiltern Hundreds.
A by-election therefore is necessary, and the local Conservative Association has elected as the Conservative candidate Sir Arthur Griffith-Boscawen, minister of agriculture in the Lloyd George Government and now minister of health in the Bonar Law cabinet. Sir Arthur was defeated in the last general election, and has since been without a seat in the Commons.
