V. O. N. NURSES KEPT BUSY

An exceptionally busy month in bedside nursing was reported at the meeting of the directors of the Victorian Order of Nurses yesterday afternoon in the Bible Society's rooms in Germain street with Hon. J. G. Forbes, the president, in the chair. In all 210 nursing cases were cared for and 1,057 bedside visits made, of which 810 visits were on the free list. The number of infant welfare visits was 480 and the total of visits of all kinds was 1,487. REV. H. MILLER RETURNS

CHALLENGE CUP READY

The William C. Magee Challenge Cup for competition among the Cadet Corps of the city has been completed in the window of Allan Gundry. It will be competed for by the corps of the city for a period of ten years and at the end of that time the corps having won it twice will compete for ownership. The cup is awarded for proficiency in drill and winners must also have had at least 10 per cent. of their members fire at least 10 rounds on outdoor or indoor ranges. Mr. Magee gave a great deal of his time to the cadet movement, and it is his earnest wish to see it prosper. It was with the idea of stimulating interest that he made provision for this trophy.

FLEMING MILL LOSS IS HEAVY

Fleming-Gibson, Limited, the lumber company of which Hon. J. R. Fleming is president and managing director, have lost by fire the largest of the four lumber mills which they own in the Miramichi valley. The mill, which was destroyed while the crew of fifty odd men were engaged at the plant, had a capacity of between 30,000 and 40,000 feet of long lumber daily and in addition was equipped with sawing machines. The box factory was saved as well as a quantity of long lumber in the yard, but \$2,000 worth of manufactured lumber were burned with the mill. Mr. Fleming placed the loss at about \$400,000 and said that only about one-third was covered by insurance. He said that steps were being taken immediately to rebuild the mill as they had more than four million feet of logs on hand to be sawed there this year and expected a continuous sawing season.

MacLaren and Caldwell Discuss Branch Railway Line Matters.

Ottawa, April 1.—The projected construction of the branch line from Kingsclear on the St. John & Quebec Railway in New Brunswick to a point on the St. Croix river, opposite Vanceboro, Me., embracing an estimated mileage of 41 miles at a cost of \$4,128,000 was discussed in the House of Commons this afternoon. Twenty-six bills providing for branch lines throughout the Dominion will be introduced.

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THREE DIE AS FIRE DESTROYS HOTEL

Grand Rapids, Mich., April 2.—Three persons dead, six injured and several missing, make up the casualty list of a fire that virtually destroyed the Livingston Hotel last night and early today, with a property loss estimated in excess of \$250,000. The dead are: Bessie Marlowe, 27, Reed City, Mich.; Giles Wade, 70, Grand Rapids, and Edward Sargent, St. Paul, Minn. Miss Marlowe was killed when she leaped six stories to the ground. Sargent attempted to jump two stories to the roof of the Herald building and fell between the two buildings. The charred body of Wade was found in the ruins.

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AUSTRALIA O. K.'S CONFERENCE ACTION

Melbourne, Australia, April 2.—(Canadian Press cable)—After rejecting by a vote of 36 to 19 the Labor amendment "that the House approve the British Government's foreign policy which aims at advancing the peace of the world," the commonwealth House of Representatives yesterday carried Premier Bruce's own resolution approving the conclusions of the Imperial conference regarding foreign relations, defence and preference. He declared it was vital for Australia to get preference.

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
