Passengers Are Nearly All Britishers to Locate in

The Canadian Pacific steamship Montclare, Captain G. S. Webster, arrived in port Saturday night at 9 o'clock from Liverpool, Belfast and Greenock and docked at Nos. 2 and 3 befths, Sand Point. The large liner brought to Canada 122 cabin and 413 third class passengers, 4,087 bags and 840 packages of mall, about 2,000 tons of general cargo, also two carloads of haggage and express. The mall was landed just as soon as the steamer docked and all for other points

The passengers were nearly all British subjects and were an exceptionally fine looking class of people. At Belfast the steamer took on seven cabin and 36 third class; at Glasgow 18 cabin and 156 third class, and at Liverpool 97 cabin and 221 third class. Included in the third class were several skilled mechanics and many farmers who came to Canada to seek their fortunes. Out of the 535 passengers, 437 were British and 98 were Continentals.


