BILLS FOR CLOTHING FACTOR IN CASE IN THE PROBATE COURT

Some Claims Against Mrs. Elizabeth Case's Estate Disallowed, One is Sanctioned by Court—Many to Share DeMill Estate

In the probate court today, in the matter of the estate of Mrs. Elizabeth Case, judgment was delivered in the case of the claims of Angus A. Chasson and of Edgecombe & Chasson against the estate. The first claim was founded upon four promissory notes, three of which were given and signed by Frank A. Baird, since deceased, a son of the deceased, in favour of the claimant—Mrs. Case having, it is alleged, requested the claimant to accommodate her son in regard to these notes.

The court found that as to the first two notes they were outlawed and as to the whole four notes there was no promise in writing to pay by the deceased, the notes were not her debt; that there was nothing to take the case out of the statute of frauds, and His Honor accordingly found in favour of the estate and that the claimant would not be allowed any costs out of the estate.

In the case of the firm against the estate, the claimants had furnished the deceased's son Frank, who is also since deceased, with clothes, beginning in 1902, to the value of \$216.25 which had been paid by payments made by him to \$137.25. In 1905 they threatened to sue the son and in consequence of Mrs. Case's undertaking verbally to pay the bill they did not press the same for payment.

A year later a new account was opened for clothes furnished the son and was charged to the mother and on this she had made payments. Judgment was given against the claimants in regard to that portion of the claim which was charged to the son, and in favour of the claimants for the balance of the amount charged to the mother, amounting to \$26.75. The claimants having succeeded in part their costs will be paid out of the estate. Scott E. Morrell appeared for the claimant in the first case, D. King Hazen for the firm in the second case and M. G. Todd, K. C., and J. C. Belyea for the executor in both cases.

The will of Thomas Reid, formerly of the parish of Simonds, more lately of the city of St. John, manufacturer, was proved. He gives all his estate to his wife Isabella for life, and after her death \$500 to his daughter Amelia, wife of John J. Scott of East Beach, or her estate, to be divided equally between his son William and his daughter Isabella. He nominates his son executor and the latter was sworn in as such. There is no real estate, personal estate about \$8,000.

John White, K. C., is executor. The master of the estate of Harold A. Taylor, millman came up. He died intestate leaving a widow, two children and a stepson. Each of the three children is under age. On the petition of the widow she appointed herself administrator. There is no real estate, personal estate of nominal value, Hanington & Hanington are executors.

In the matter of the estate of William James DeMill there was an adjourned hearing return of citation to pass the accounts of William Henry DeMill of Upperham, the administrator. Deceased was accompanied by who died intestate. His estate amounts to about \$6,000 above liabilities which is ordered to be divided among his next of kin. He was one of eight brothers and sisters all of whom predeceased him excepting one sister. The share of each of his children is entitled to a share by reason of their parents having predeceased them, descendants of brothers and sisters who become entitled to shares per stirpes, are as follows: Nine nephews, eleven nieces, eight grand-nephews, six grand-nieces, five great-grand-nephews and two great-grand-nieces. The share to which each is entitled varies from 1-7 to the sister to 1-128 to the most remote one connected with the deceased. George O. Dickson City is proctor for the administrator, John Kerr, K. C., proctor for some of the next of kin.

FIRE A SHOT TO BRING POLICE TO ARREST GEO. ORAM. Letter Said He Was Looking For a Relative in Main Street About 1 a.m.—Allen Arrested Again

In the Police Court this morning John Murphy was fined \$4 or ten days in jail and Thomas Fleming \$8 or two months in jail for drunkenness. George Oram, arrested on charge of being drunk in Murray street, was fined \$8 or two months in jail.

Policeman Convey told of being awakened between 1 and 2 o'clock this morning by two women screaming in the street opposite his house. On going down to the street he saw Oram standing in the middle of the road. The policeman fired a shot to attract the attention of one of the North End policemen, but as they did not come he arrested the man himself. Oram, he said, had been apparently trying to force an entrance into several houses in the vicinity, and was very drunk. The prisoner told the court that he was looking for a relative of his who lived in the vicinity and happened to get into the wrong house. When arrested he had \$79.17 in his possession.

John Allen, an old offender, was also before the court, charged with drunkenness and also with begging in the street. Policeman Wittren told of Allen going into several stores in Prince William street and begging money, also being under the influence of liquor. He was fined \$8 or two months in jail with hard labor for the drunkenness and was remanded on the begging charge. Allen was arrested some time ago on the charge of obtaining money under false pretences and was allowed to go on suspended sentence by Judge Barry.
