

FIRE CLAIMS EIGHT

Carey Family Near Swan Lake, Man., Nearly Annihilated.

FATHER'S CASE HOPELESS

Mother, School Teacher, Five Daughters and a Son Perish in Fire That Breaks Out in House—Saw That In Barn at Time of Disaster—Coal Oil Thought to Be the Cause—Perished in Bed.

Swan Lake, Man., Nov. 7.—One of the most terrible tragedies in the history of Manitoba, and one which nearly wiped out an entire family, occurred yesterday morning on the farm of Edward Carey, near here, when Mrs. Carey, her five daughters, one son, and Miss Gillespie, a teacher in the Lake View school, who boarded with the Carey family, were burned to death in a fire which destroyed their home, while Mr. Carey himself was so severely injured in the awful holocaust that he cannot long survive. Very little is known of how the fire, which cost eight lives, originated, as none of those who may have seen it remain to tell.

Mr. Carey and his eldest son, Herbert, arose at an early hour, and the latter at once proceeded to the barn to attend to the stock while his father, who was shocked to notice the house in flames, and rushed back just in time to rescue the charred body of his father from the flames before the roof fell in, burying all who were near and dear to him in the raging fire. It is believed from the position in which the charred remains were found amidst the ruins yesterday afternoon that all had perished in their beds, and some of the smaller ones probably never awakened to realize their terrible fate.

While nothing definite as to the cause of the fire can be learned, it is presumed that Carey had attempted to use coal oil in lighting the fire, and that an explosion followed, which not only enveloped him in flames, but set the house on fire, the flames spreading with such rapidity that the escape of the sleeping members of the family was cut off almost instantly.

Six other people have been burned to death as a result of coal oil explosions in Manitoba within two weeks, and it is believed that the inferior grade of oil, below the regulation flash point, is being sold here, with murderous results. Some of it has actually been tested and will explode like gasoline.

TO START HYDRO ELECTRIC.

Mayors of Cities Interested Will Foregather on Nov. 18.

Toronto, Nov. 7.—Wednesday, the 18th inst., is the date upon which the Ontario Hydro-Electric Power Commission expect to have work sufficiently advanced on the new transmission line to have a formal commencement ceremony.

This will take place outside the Toronto city limits at a point northwest of the city.

Alfred Fryer of Galt, president of the Western Power Union of Municipalities, will preside, and the mayors and other officials of the cities interested will be invited to be present.

Sir James Whitney and the members of the Ontario Cabinet will, of course, have a prominent part in the proceedings.

Cotton Strike Settled. Manchester, Nov. 7.—The dispute which has been going on for nearly two months between the cotton operators of Manchester and their employees was settled yesterday, the employers having compromised on a reduction of wages in March instead of January. The mills will reopen Nov. 9. They have been closed for seven weeks, and much distress has resulted.

Alum In Pickles. Ottawa, Nov. 7.—Of 1400 samples of pickles collected throughout Canada during the months of July and August and analyzed by A. McGill, all but two were found to be in good condition. In two cases alum had been used to harden the vegetables.

Won't Follow Deakin. London, Nov. 7.—(C.A.P.)—In the Federal House of Representatives at Melbourne yesterday, Wisher, the Labor leader, announced that the party was unable to continue to support Premier Deakin's Ministry. Deakin moved an adjournment and the House rose.

Belleville Nurse Killed. Belleville, Nov. 7.—Miss Minnie Palmer, a trained nurse of this city, was severely injured in a runaway accident at Cortland, Ky., a few days ago, and died from her injuries. Her sister, Mrs. E. B. Morden of this city, was with her when she died.

Won't Hear Appeals. Vancouver, B.C., Nov. 7.—Justice Clement yesterday declined to hear appeals on what he called "hearsay disputes" against his sentences of death imposed on Pettella and Chang, murderers, who are to be hanged Dec. 18.

Dr. Drennan Resigns. St. Thomas, Nov. 7.—The announcement was made yesterday that Dr. Rennie Drennan, superintendent of the Amasa Wood Hospital, had tendered his resignation the first of the month.

Suicides by Chewing His Tongue. Vancouver, B.C., Nov. 7.—Arthur Newman, serving a five-year term in prison, committed suicide Thursday by chewing his tongue, causing him to bleed to death.

Ward Will Win. London, Nov. 7.—(C.A.P.)—A Times' Wellington despatch says indications are that Premier Ward will be returned with a majority of 30.

REV. DR. COURTICE DEAD

WAS FORMERLY EDITOR OF THE CHRISTIAN GUARDIAN.

(From Wednesday's Daily.)

Rev. Dr. A. C. Courtice, a distinctive character in Canadian Methodist circles, passed away yesterday afternoon at his home, Gerrard street east, Toronto, aged 51 years. Although he had not been in good health for a long time, no alarming symptoms developed till three weeks ago, when asthma and other complications reached an acute stage.

Deceased, who was the son of the late Thomas Courtice of Port Perry, was educated at the University of Toronto, obtaining the gold medal in philosophy. Pursuing his theological studies at Victoria University, then at Cobourg, he obtained the Sandford medal in 1885 and was ordained to the ministry the same year. His abilities as a pastor and preacher were speedily recognized, his services being sought by several large congregations. The late Dr. Courtice occupied the pulpit of Parliament St. church, Toronto; Dundas Street, London; Dominion Square, Montreal, and Sydenham Street, Kingston. At the last named church deceased remained until his election in 1893 to the editorship of The Christian Guardian, the chief organ of the Methodist Church in Canada.

BRIEFS FROM THE WIRES.

The battleship North Dakota, the first American dreadnaught, was launched at Quincy, Mass., yesterday.

In a friendly boxing bout in New York last night, John Vandebek, a 20-year-old clerk, was killed by Edward Lynch, a 19-year-old clerk.

Fred R. Flash, who was in the wholesale commission business in Buffalo for a number of years, disappeared on Oct. 10, and nothing has been heard of him since.

The Netherlands squadron in the Caribbean Sea will be reinforced the middle of December by the battleship De Ruijter, and in the month of January by the cruiser Utrecht.

Samuel C. J. Woodward, 46 years of age, who says he is a Canadian doctor, was sentenced in London, England, to ten years in prison for marrying his wife, a Russian, while he was in the military service of the British.

The executive committee of the Imperial Press conference to be held in London, in June, 1909, have mailed invitations to proprietors and editors of newspapers in various parts of the Empire.

Official confirmation has been received at St. Petersburg from Tcheran of a reactionary plot to abolish the Russian Parliament. Russia will reject her energetic representation by just the contemplated coup d'etat.

The steamer George Washington of the German Lloyd line was successfully launched at Bremen, Germany. The George Washington is of 27,000 tons gross, 722 feet long, and is the largest German-built and owned steamer in the world. She will have a speed of 18.5 knots.

Chosen to Slay King. Lisbon, (Monday, 9, via the frontier), Nov. 11.—Alberto Costa, a former member of the Chamber of Deputies, committed suicide here. His act has created a tremendous sensation.

Snor Costa was a member of the Black Cross Society, which was involved in the assassination last February of King Carlos and Crown Prince Louis.

It is believed that this society selected Costa by lot to kill the present King Emmanuel, and that Costa preferred to kill himself to committing this deed.

Rolls Down Mountain. Hamilton, Nov. 11.—Robert Hunt, Hamilton Twp., rolled down the side of the mountain last evening and was taken to the City Hospital in a battered condition with many cuts and bruises about the head and body.

He was driving home when the horse got off the road and the whole outfit rolled over the brink of the mountain. A tree stopped the horse and rig, but Hunt was shot out of the rig and rolled to the bottom. His condition is serious.

A lynx, five feet from tip to tail, was shot near Cornwall.

Nehemiah Broadway of London dropped dead of heart failure.

John Aitkins, an old resident of Hamilton, is dead.

S. F. Lister, K.C. of Hamilton asked the Court of Revision to assess him for \$41,000 income which the assessor had overlooked.

TESTIMONY GROWS

More Evidence Against Gregory in Mafine Inquiry.

TO SUSPEND GRAFT-TAKERS

Hen. L. P. Brodeur Expected to Take Drastic Action—Merchant Testifies to Paying Gregory Checks on Account of Commission—Says Overcharges Amounted in Some Cases to 25 Per Cent.

Quebec, Nov. 7.—More light was let yesterday afternoon into the system pursued by the dealers who furnished supplies to the Marine and Fisheries Department, a system which Mr. Watson, K.C., described as one of "bribery, corruption and boodling."

Mr. Lemieux, a partner of the Samson hardware firm, occupied the witness stand during the greater part of the afternoon, and being shown a number of checks payable to bearer, issued by his firm, admitted that most of them were given to Mr. Gregory. There was one in September, 1907, for \$100, in 1906 two for \$250 each and one for \$50; and in 1907, two for \$250 each and three for \$150 each. The stubs of these checks being produced, it was shown that the name of Mr. Samson, the head of the firm, was marked opposite to them.

Mr. Perron asked why this was done, when the checks were intended for Mr. Gregory, and whether it was not possible that it was because they did not want Mr. Gregory's name to appear.

Witness said that might have been the reason. In August, 1907, witness had transactions with Gregory and paid the 5 per cent. commission by check. He said he had placed Mr. Samson's name on the stub.

"Is it not true, speaking according to your heart and conscience, that the name of Mr. Gregory was not to appear?" asked Mr. Perron.

"Yes," he replied.

Asked whether the overcharges in dispute between the firm and the Department had been settled, witness replied in the affirmative, but being asked for the statement of the settlement, said he had not got it. Mr. Gregory might have it.

Questioned as to the difference between the charges made to the Government and others by his firm, witness said he knew little. Wholesale prices were charged merchants and retail ones to others. The Government was treated as ordinary persons and not as merchants, though the firm sold \$77,000 worth of goods to the Government in three years and no merchant house could match that. He did not tell the difference between wholesale and retail prices; perhaps Mr. Samson could.

Mr. Perron pressed for an answer as to whether the firm made 15 or 25 per cent. between the wholesale and the retail prices, and witness reluctantly replied that in some cases it was 25 per cent. He said Mr. Gregory sometimes made prices.

In some cases they charged the Government more than others.

"Lawyers do the same," said Senator Choquette.

"Speak for yourself," returned Mr. Perron.

Ottawa, Nov. 7.—Hon. L. P. Brodeur, Minister of Marine and Fisheries, is at present on a tour of inspection of the St. Lawrence river.

In his absence there is no likelihood of an order being issued from the Department suspending the officials of the Quebec agency, who are alleged to have taken commissions from F. X. Drol and other business men of the Ancient Capital.

It is quite probable that Mr. Brodeur will order the suspension of a number of the officials when he arrives in Quebec.

Woman Wounded by Husband. Buffalo, Nov. 7.—Mrs. John Hagen, who was shot by her husband Thursday, is in a serious condition. The Buffalo News says Mrs. Hagen, who is 43 years of age, was Miss Carrie Haelein before her marriage, and came to Buffalo from Toronto.

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Building Collapsed. Toronto, Nov. 7.—The high wind of yesterday morning caused the collapse of three storeys of skeleton frame work at the building owned by Mrs. W. J. Ingram at the corner of Gerrard street and Galt avenue.

A man working on a five-foot drain on Galt avenue had a narrow escape, falling timber, and planks having fallen over the hole, completely entombing him for some time.

To Favor British. London, Nov. 5.—The medical officers of the London School Council proposed a scheme yesterday to the council, urging that all home-grown meat offered for sale in Smithfield market should be marked. The committee on agriculture and diseases of animals expressed approval of the project.

Regarding the criminal prosecution of sellers of unground meat, the butchers are joining with the Meat Traders' Association in urging the Government to pay a compensation for all carcasses seized by the authorities.

Thrown Into Quarry. Owen Sound, Nov. 5.—Albert Porter, a mulatto, is in custody, charged with trying to murder Andrew Peterson. Tuesday night about 11 o'clock persons passing Checkley's Quarry, in the northwest section of the town, heard cries for help, and found Peterson lying at the bottom of the pit.

He was suffering from a compound fracture of the thigh, and was cut and bruised from head to foot, but was able to say that Porter had thrown him there. The men had been drinking during the afternoon.

M'CALLUM ARRESTED.

Bank Teller Is Formally Charged With Theft.

Toronto, Nov. 11.—Donald Cameron McCallum was handed over to Detective Harry Trigg by Superintendent W. H. Welsh of the Canadian Detective Bureau at his office yesterday afternoon. He was locked up on a warrant sworn out by Charles R. Hill, manager of the head office of the Farmers' Bank, charging him with theft of \$16,405. Of this sum \$5,033 has been recovered in undisposed assets of McCallum.

The loss of the balance, \$11,412, will fall upon the Fidelity Guarantee Co. It was stated last night by one who has been on the inside track from the start, that no one else is implicated in the confession made by McCallum, but that any help he received in working his schemes was innocently given in the regular course of bank business.

McCallum will appear in the Police Court this morning, and should his counsel arrive from Owen Sound, will likely plead guilty without further delay.

Bank officials say that their action in taking out the warrant was not hurried by the discovery, but was intended from the start.

No effort was made last night to secure bail.

REIGN OF TERROR.

Revolutionists in Calcutta Kill Detective on Street—Arms Smuggled In.

Calcutta, Nov. 11.—The City of Calcutta is terrorized by an outbreak of political crimes.

The daring but unsuccessful attempt made three days ago on the life of Sir Andrew H. L. Fraser, the Lieutenant-Governor of Bengal, was followed by a murder Monday evening.

A Bengal detective who had been ordered on duty to prevent sympathetic demonstrations, was shot down on a crowded street by three men.

The people fear to give information concerning the criminals, lest they be visited upon them. The police are powerless. One of the two natives who was found guilty of murdering a man named Gossans last summer was hanged yesterday.

All the police reserves of the city have been ordered on duty to prevent sympathetic demonstrations.

In the course of a trial at Midnapore, Bengal, in connection with a discovery of arms and explosives, the accused were ordered to produce a list of all the rifles and revolvers had been shipped from America to Bombay under the guise of sewing machines and cotton goods.

Parties Now Tied.

Halifax, Nov. 11.—With the Government and the Opposition each holding eighteen seats, Newfoundland is now confronted with a situation probably unparalleled in the annals of British political history.

Whether Sir Robert Bond will resign and Sir Edward Morris be engaged to take the task of forming a new Administration, or whether he will endeavor to carry on the Government by electing an Opposition member as Speaker, or whether he will go to the country again are still moot questions.

Insurance In Jamaica.

London, Nov. 11.—(C.A.P.)—A Kingston, Jamaica, cable says: "Canadian underwriters representing three fire insurance companies are starting business here on a policy which does not contain an earthquake clause, with the understanding that the decision of the Supreme Court of Jamaica is to be final in any litigation which may arise."

The Canadian companies are the Anglo-American, the Montreal-Canada, and the Ontario. They are grouped as the Royal Canadian Underwriters.

Toronto Actress Disappears.

Pittsburg, Penn., Nov. 11.—Jane Davis, member of a theatrical company which went to pieces during a tour of towns in this section, is missing, and the police of a dozen cities have been asked to search for her.

Miss Davis, whose right name is Jane Milburn of Toronto, Canada, disappeared from a hotel in Cumberland, Md. A sister resides in Toronto.

Farm Hand Loots House.

Dunnville, Nov. 11.—The house of A. Young, a farmer near here, was robbed Thursday night. The family was away. They left Robert Bruce, who had been given employment by them, at home, and on their return they found the place in great disorder, and a number of articles of jewelry missing.

Burglary at Napanee. Napanee, Nov. 11.—The clothing store owned by J. L. Boyes was broken into by a burglar last night. The contents of the cash register taken. Four doors were broken through. An unsuccessful attempt was made to break through the door connecting with the Grand Trunk and Canadian Express Companies.

Druggist In Court. Chatham, Nov. 11.—Capt. J. W. McLaren, drug store proprietor, and Hogan and Hoy, owners of the Algonquin hotel, came up in the police court on charges of selling liquor to G. Hurns, Barth street, on Sunday. McLaren will face the additional charge of selling without a license.

Power For Winnipeg. Winnipeg, Nov. 11.—The Winnipeg Electric Railway has offered to supply the city with 5,000 horse-power at \$18.00 per horse-power per the first year and at the same rate for 10,000 horse-power the second and third years.

Tug Hackett Aground. Kingston, Nov. 11.—While on her way to Kingston with two light barges the tug Hackett went aground at Weaver's Point near Aultsville yesterday.

HINDU CONSPIRACY

East Indians in British Columbia Said to Be Making Bombs.

SENT TO REBELS AT HOME

Sikh Tells Vancouver Police That Secret Organization at Millside Is Engaged in Manufacture of Explosive Machines and Purchase of Arms For Disaffected in Calcutta and Other Districts.

Vancouver, Nov. 7.—That a conspiracy having for its object the manufacture of bombs and supplying them, together with arms, to malcontents in Calcutta and other disaffected districts in India exists among the Hindus at Millside, near Westminister was the startling information yesterday conveyed by a Sikh to a police official in this city who formerly resided in India, who speaks Bengali and who has befriended numbers of these people since their arrival in British Columbia.

To what lengths the plot has already gone, it is difficult to learn, for reason that the heads of the conspiracy are comparatively few in number and very closely guard the innermost secrets of their work. In a general way, however, scores of Hindus, now living at Millside, are aware that the manufacture of bombs is proceeding in a secret guarded room at that place.

They also have general knowledge that money secured from them by subscription from time to time is ultimately converted into firearms, with which the "yoke" of Great Britain is to be thrown off by India's millions.

One of the principals in the conspiracy is a Hindu working at the saw mills at Millside, but the chief plotter is a resident of Seattle. The latter formerly lived in Vancouver, and always affected to have great influence over his countrymen.

U. S. President-Elect Taft has gone to Hot Springs for a rest.

Three persons were asphyxiated by gas from a kitchen stove in Washington yesterday.

The U. S. House of Representatives will be composed of 218 Republicans and 173 Democrats.

The resignation of the Austrian Cabinet is imminent. Disunion between the German and Czech Ministers are given as the cause.

The steamer Taish was lost in a storm off Japan. One hundred and fifty persons were drowned. Most of the passengers were fishermen.

Mrs. Ghila Millicent Franklin Burch, wife of a prominent Franklin contractor, and a descendant of an English peer, is seeking a divorce in Nevada on the ground of failure to provide and desertion.

Earthquake In Germany.

Plauen, Germany, Nov. 7.—The most violent earthquake ever experienced here terrified the inhabitants of the city at 5:40 o'clock yesterday morning. Houses were shaken, and the people fled panic-stricken into the streets. The shock, which lasted for several minutes, was accompanied by sharp explosions and thunderous rumblings in the earth.

Sixty or seventy earthquake shocks have been felt here daily the past week. They are now becoming less frequent, but more violent. The temperature of the medicinal springs in the vicinity has increased fifteen degrees.

Crew May Be Lost.

St. John, N.B., Nov. 7.—The schooner Ida May, bound from New York for St. John, with a cargo of coal, is ashore at Browne Island, N.S., and it is feared the crew may be lost, as there is no sign of them or of a boat.

It is just possible they have reached land somewhere, or may have been picked up by a passing vessel. Capt. George E. Gale of St. John is in command of the Ida May, which is owned here.

Sensation In Chicago.

Chicago, Nov. 7.—The Thompson family, backed by deadly weapons, holds possession of the residence of Samuel Gregston, the Hindustani millionaire, near whose sick bed two sons-in-law, it is alleged, engaged in a hasty encounter which resulted in a court proceeding before Justice of the Peace Edgar Davis Thursday.

Motor Bus For Toronto. Toronto, Nov. 7.—A motor bus company is being organized in Toronto, to put the modern motor bus on the street and cater to citizens who are opposed to crowded street cars. It is said that the company will have fifty of the buses in commission by May 1, 1909. Buses will be run on three or four suitable routes.

Killed by Derrick Pole. Petrolia, Nov. 7.—William Slack, foreman for Mr. Schumacher's oil property, was cleaning out one of the wells when the three-pole derrick broke, one of the poles striking Mr. Slack on the back. He lived about one hour.

Publicity Bureau. Ottawa, Nov. 7.—The Ottawa Board of Trade has passed a resolution suggesting that the city should establish a publicity bureau, and will provide \$2,000 of the cost if the suggestion is acted upon.

Dies Climbing Stairs. Berlin, Nov. 7.—Joseph Muekus, auctioneer, was found dead in bed at the home of Mrs. Stabel, his cousin, Thursday night.

Queen Dowager Ill. Lisbon, Nov. 7.—The newspapers say the health of the Queen Dowager, Maria Pia, is causing anxiety. She is 81 years of age.
