FIRST EDITION. CHASED BY DETECTIVES.

A BINKERTON AGENT MAKES AN IMPORTANT ARREST. Another Chapter in a Complicated Criminal Case—A Story of Murder, Assault and Blatant Theft—A Tale of Mystery and Suspense.
