''Pretoria, July 17.—Yesterday the enemy made a determined attack on the left of Pole-Carew's position and along our left flank, commanded by Hutton. The posts held by the Irish Fusiliers and the Canadian Mounted Infantry, under Lieut.-Col. Anderson, were most gallantly defended. The enemy made repeated attempts to assault the positions, coming in close range and calling to the Fusiliers to surrender. The enemy suffered severely. They had fiften killed and fifty wounded, and four taken prisoners. The British casualties were seven killed, including the Canadian Lieutenants Borden and Birch, thirly wounded, and twenty-one missing.

The report of the Committee on Parliamentary action and Legislation, called upon all citizens throughout the Dominion to resent the injustice done by the Dominion Government in failing to recognize the mandate of the electorate in the plebiscite of 1808, and urged them to organize to secure the return only of men who can be relied upon to help knock out the demon drink.

The recommendation was adopted, and the Council reaffirmed the action of the Ontario Alliance of Tuesday, in deciding to organize immediately to secure the defeat of the approaching general elections of all members of Parliament who voted against carrying out the will of the people. The selling of liquor in military canteens was again denounced and the authorities called upon to abolish the practice.
