WIRELESS TELEGRAPHY

Section 137 of the Post and Telegraph Act, 1906, says:—

No person shall establish, install or work any apparatus for wireless telegraphy in any place in Newfoundland except under and in accordance with a license granted by the Post Office.

Forms for Amateur License may be obtained at office of Minister of Posts & Telegraphs, St. John's, and call signals furnished and recorded.
