- A. All that I know is that we built up that house it was for Peter George.
- Q. Was Peter George to pay Mr. Truthwaite sanything for it?
- A. No, the house was built up for this man because he was working for Thomas Truthwaite. We built up that house on the ---
- Q. What was to happen to the house when he stopped working for Thomas Truthwaite? A. He was put there because he was a servant of Thomas Truthwaite, that was all.
- Q. In fact you do not know what the arrangement was, do you?
- A. No more than what Mr. Truthwaite had told me, he had to find him a house because he had a family.
- Q. You worked for Thomas Truthwaite at that time?
- A. Yes.
- Q. And you were married in 1860? A. Yes.
- Q. Did he build a house for you? A. Oh, no. I did not want anybody to build a house for me, I could build a house for my-self. I was independent at that time.
- Q. Did you get paid anything for building that house for Peter George? A. Yes.
- Q. How much did you get paid?
- A. I used to get \$1.50 a day.
- Q. How many days were you occupied in building it?
- A. Oh, I could not tell you because I was paid both for working for that place and for building stables and things like that.
- Q. For whom were you building the stables?
- A. Mr. Truthwaite, of course.
- Q. You are not in a position to say whether Mr. Truthwaite was not paid by Peter George for your services?
- A. No.
