The names of Parnell and Gladstone were greeted with applause. Mr. Blake, after reviewing the events which had hap-

pened in Irish polities since he spoke in Boston a year ago, confined himself principally to the discussion of the provisions and objects of the home rule bill and the autonomous feature of the measure, He declared that there was no fear that the position of the house of lords would prove a permanent barrier to home The wisest of them do not prerule. tend that they will have any right sto disregard the measure when it shall be brought forward by the country


