STEAMER SINKS IN COLLISION

SIX LIVES LOST IN FOG DISASTER OFF SANDY HOOK

Panic Among Women Aboard Finance-Rescue Work by

SS. Georgic.

New York, Nov. 26 .- Fog, the heavlest known for years, which has paraused traffic in New York harbor for our days, caused the loss of six lives to-day when the Panama rainoad steamer Finance, bound for Colon with 5 passengers on board, was sunk in collision with the White Star freight steamer Georgic, in the main ship MAN-HUNT THROUGH channel off Sandyhook.

Cinef Engineer John W. Puckett, his third assistant engineer, William H. Todd, and an oiler named Charles Eric, all of the Finance, remained at their Mystery Surrounds Moveposts or were caught in the wreckage and went down with the ship. Three passengers are missing and are believed to be drowned. They are: Miss Irene Campbell, of Colon; Henry Muller a conductor on the Panama railmad: and Police Rhydeland, of the canal zone police.
