TERRAINS DEVASTATED IN SOUTHERN SPAIN; HUNDREDS ARE DEAD

LONDON, Jan. 29.—A dispatch received here from San Sebastian, Spain, says that a terrible earthquake has devastated several towns and villages in south and southwestern Spain. A tidal wave partially submerged the coast near Barcelona and a great landslide at Ceuta buried the village of Romara and several hundred inhabitants.

Barcelona Overwhelmed
LONDON, Jan. 30.—A dispatch from Tarragona says that Barcelona has been overwhelmed by a tidal wave. The loss of life is unknown. Subterranean roarings preceded the tidal wave, causing a fearful panic among the people on the promenade and in the buildings of the city.

Tarragona, whence comes the report of a great tidal wave at Barcelona, is fifteen miles distant from the latter city. Barcelona is the second largest city in Spain, situated on the Mediterranean in the northern part of the country. It has a population of 49,000.
Murcia, where the shock is also reported to have been felt, is in southern Spain, a short distance inland from the Mediterranean coast. Malaga, where a shock was reported early today, is in extreme western Spain, the Mediterranean coast. The meagre advice thus far received indicates that the earthquake was along the entire Mediterranean coast.

SCAMMELL SAYS MAYES DID NOT DO A GOOD JOB

Alleges That Boulders Were Not Lifted But Shoved Along—City Failed to Act Promptly in Examining the Berth.

In the report on conditions at No. 6 berth which J. K. Scammell, resident engineer of the public works department, has forwarded to Ottawa, the mystery of the boulders which have been lying on the wharf during the last three months and after the department had reported the berth clear, is gone into. It is contended by Mr. Scammell that the dredge Beaver, in dredging, displaced and lodged material and boulders in the berth. He says that the fact that the city was notified last July that the berth was satisfactory and that the contractor was allowed several months to elapse before ordering the berth to be dragged is also referred to.

COMMISSION'S PURPOSE TO DISCREDIT EX-MAYOR
Minority Report of Member of Finance Commission Scores Other Members.
BOSTON, Mass., Jan. 29.—In a minority report, John F. Kennedy, the representative of the Boston Central Labor Union on the Finance Commission says that "it seems to have been the fixed purpose and policy of my colleagues, chiefly to discredit the administration of ex-Mayor Fitzgerald," and he adds, "I am not willing to join in painting everything black about a single administration and in suppressing everything good that can be found in connection with it, not ignoring the glaring defects and abuses that have existed under all others."
Mr. Kennedy declines to join in any recommendation which looks to the substitution of the contract system for the direct employment of labor on the city streets. "I am not in favor of extravagance or waste," says Mr. Kennedy "but so far as large expenditures are necessary due to the direct employment of labor by the city, or to saving municipal work from under trade union conditions, I am certainly in favor of such
