"EDUCATION" IS WINNER'S SUBJECT

An oratorical contest was held at the high school here Friday evening under the auspices of Barrington Memorial Chapter, I. O. O. E., when prizes donated by the chapter were awarded to Miss Frances Jessome, Jean M. Gagne and Della McFarlane. Others participating were Miss Fernande Cormier, Francis Dickson and Miss Doris Leaman.

Miss Jessome spoke on "Education," and explained novel ideas as to how children should be instructed and schools conducted. Gagne's subject was "The League of Nations," which, he contended, had really been achieved success and should be supported by all, as it is the only body whose sole purpose is to achieve peace between the nations and in the only hope for peace.

Plus Michaud, K. C., J. G. Boucher and P. Dodd Tweedie acted as judges. D. R. Bishop, principal of the Edmundston schools, was chairman, and introductory remarks were made by Dr. P. H. Laporte, chairman of the board of school trustees.

TEXT OF MISS JESSOME'S ORATION

EDUCATION

(By Frances Jessome)

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and gentlemen, Ever since man appeared upon the earth, he has striven to overcome his environment, and the progress from savagery to the present state of civilization is the result of this struggle.

Education, in its broadest meaning of the term, means the development of the powers of man; in the restricted sense in which the term is ordinarily used, it means the training of children, youth and adults in educational institutions — common schools, colleges, universities and professional schools.

There are different kinds, but the one we shall consider especially is Natural Education. The name natural education has been chosen to designate the kind which nature surely intended for all her children — education through play, directed towards a definite end throughout life.

To be compelled to study or to engage in a career when one's interest is utterly lacking is work. If the interest is sharply engaged, it is play. The pathway of knowledge for children should be one of joy and not one of drudgery.

Education must begin at a very early age, parents should be the teachers. Children must have good foundations. Play is the best development when they are allowed to grow like weeds. From the time you see them sprout, they are taken care of. Then why should children be allowed to grow like weeds during their most impressive years? Every normal child born in this world has some special talent given to him, some aptitude for a particular profession. Why, then, some will ask "Are there not more famous people in the world?" It is because this talent is never developed. Earlier development will do much to bring out this talent. History tells us that nearly all great men have shown signs of their wonderful talents almost in babyhood. Julius Caesar was only three years old when he rode to war behind his Uncle Marius. Napoleon played his childish games with imaginary warriors, while very young, and Alexander the Great, when his father was absent, went out to parley with the ambassadors. Interest was present to make their work, which was to be their future, a game.

In High Schools some pupils find their work more difficult than any previous year. This information which seems to them dull, and uninteresting might all have been given to them, before this time. They might have acquired, during their younger years, all that is drudgery now.

Nature never intended that her children should be put within brick walls, as if they were prisoners, when they go to school. It is all wrong. Work should seem like play, monotony in school kills interest. Games should be introduced, games that develop their minds as well as their bodies. The best toy that any child can have is a typewriter. No better means can be furnished to develop his mind, and to aid the child in reading, spelling, to punctuate and to memorize. If he learns to operate this machine, he will develop his hands so well that he will not have the same difficulty in playing a piano, or a stringed instrument as he would if he came to it with untrained muscles. He will teach himself

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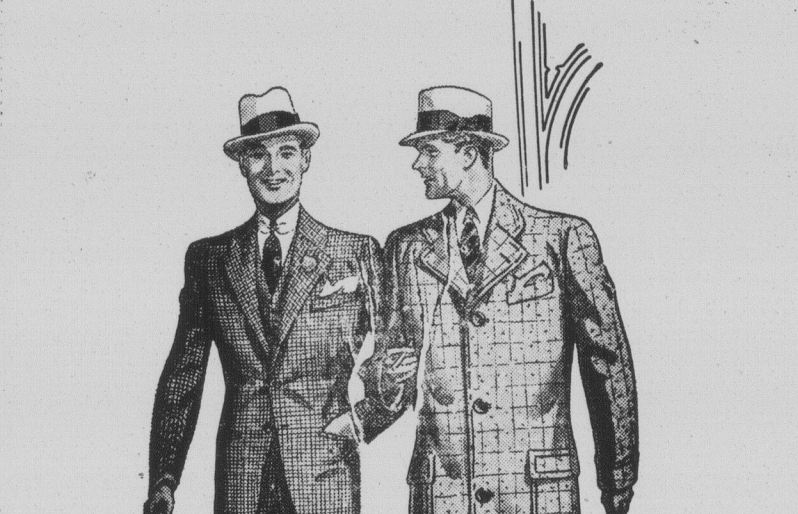
