NO BILL AGAINST THROWERS OF BOMB

Hampton, Jan. 16.—While the Grand Jury were inquiring into the bomb throwing case the civil cases were carried over to the next sitting of the county court here today.

The Grand Jury found no bill against the four young men indicted for setting off a bomb at Magistrate Alward's residence last August. They called attention to the insufficient heating plant of the jail, and in view of the anticipated influx of foreign laborers to work on railway construction, having more in mind the goal than the possibility of the recommendation that a sufficient modern system be introduced as will ensure that the cells and corridors be comfortably heated.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

Any person who has the sole lease of a family or any land over 160 acres, and who has a quarter section of available Dominion land in the Dominion of Manitoba or Alberta. The applicant must apply in person in the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency for the District of the land.

Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on the application of the father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of the landowner.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years, or the equivalent within the time of his homestead on a farm of 160 acres, or the equivalent, or occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-empted six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn Dominion patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homestead who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emptive right on a public land homestead in certain districts. Price \$20 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$200.

LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NEW BRUNSWICK

All persons seeking legislation at next session of the legislature, are requested to have one hundred copies of bill printed and folded.

At last session of the legislature the following resolution was passed by committee on municipalities: "Resolved, that it would be advisable when reference is made to any act of assembly that in addition to the usual reference, the year in which the same was enacted, shall be inserted as herewith shown. The Act 4, Edward VII, Chapter 40, 1904. And the following recommendation was made by the committee on corporations: That plans and specifications of proposed works with sufficient data be submitted with bill relating thereto.

PUBLIC NOTICE is hereby given that a Bill will be presented for enactment at the next Session of the Provincial Legislature to further amend the "St. John Assessment Act, 1909," and amending Acts.

The objects desired to be attained by this Act are:

(1) To provide that after the 1st day of January, 1912, the tax on buildings and improvements be reduced fifty per centum and after such date still further reduced from time to time until the tax on such buildings and improvements disappears altogether; and also that the land exclusive of buildings and improvements be assessed at twice the true value, to provide for the revenue lost on account of the decrease in the taxation of such buildings and improvements.

(2) To provide that personal property be exempt from taxation as soon as circumstances will permit.

(3) To empower the Common Council of the City of Saint John to appoint a Commission which shall be empowered to adjust as equitably as possible all difficulties which may arise on account of the change above mentioned, more particularly with reference to long renewal leases.

(4) To provide that the Five dollar poll tax be reduced to Two dollars.

(5) To repeal Section 1 of the Act of Assembly No. 10, Cap. 64 (1910), which provides that the tax on taxation for the years 1911, 1912, 1913, 1914 and 1915 shall not exceed the tax rate for the year 1910.

Extracts from "The Saint John City Assessment Act, 1909."

"Sec. 32. The assessors shall ascertain as fully as possible the particulars of the real estate, the personal property, and the income of any person, who has not brought in a statement in accordance with their notice and as required by this law, and shall make an estimate thereof, of the true value and amount, to the best of their information and belief; and such estimate shall be conclusive upon all persons who have not filed their statements in due time, unless they can show a reasonable excuse for the omission."

"Sec. 42. No person shall have an abatement unless he files with the assessors the statement and oath within the time required; nor shall the Common Council, in any case, sustain an appeal from the judgment of the assessors, unless they shall be satisfied that there was some error why the statement was not filed in due time as herein provided."

THE EXAMINATION under the Factory Act Amending for the granting of certificates, will be held in St. John on the afternoons and evenings of the 19th and 20th inst.; in Woodstock the 23rd inst.; Perth, 25th inst. and Edmundston, 27th inst.

All operating engines of 25 horse-power and over must obtain certificates. Engineers should remember that this will be the last opportunity to take out certificates before the Act comes into force. Those who fail to comply with the Act will be liable to penalty.
