CONDENSED FOREIGN NEWS

Another German Airship Lands on French Soil—Greeks and Servians in Agreement with Turkey.

Nancy, France, April 22.—Another international military aviation incident occurred on the Franco-German frontier this morning, when a German army aeroplane alighted on French territory at Nord Arracourt. Two German officers in uniform were on board. The machine was held, but later allowed to return to Germany.

Constantinople, April 22.—The Greeks and the Servians today concluded an agreement with Turkey, similar to that made between Bulgaria and Turkey by the terms of which hostilities are to be suspended for ten days.

A Sensational Report. New York, N. Y., April 22.—A special cable to the American from London says: Winston Churchill, First Lord of the Admiralty, it is learned today, has been the victim of a most daring and sensational robbery, in which a beautiful young woman is suspected as the possible agent of some foreign power. By the theft the First Lord not only loses \$2,500 in money, but highly important confidential naval data.

A Montreal Murder. Montreal, April 22.—Crazed, it is said, with jealousy, Tomaso Bernardi, an Italian, at noon today, shot and fatally wounded Angelina Bezzani. Bernardi also wounded the girl's male companion, Louise Scrolo, and it is believed that he also will die.

Visiting Workers. New York, N. Y., April 22.—A cable from London says: The King and Queen yesterday began another tour among the industrial classes of their subjects. Yesterday they were at Crewe and today and tomorrow will be among the people of the potteries.

Cars in Collision. Montreal, April 21.—Crashing into an automobile in which P. Lacoste, K.C., and his wife were passengers, a heavy Round-the-Mountain car figured in a thrilling automobile accident in Outremont last night, knocking the chauffeur unconscious, slicing off the two front wheels of the automobile and hurling the motor car 100 feet across St. Catherine Road. The occupants were slightly hurt.

Halifax, April 22.—Word was received here this morning that the quarry workers at Avondale, Sweet's Corner and Wentworth, Hanis county, had gone on strike for an increase of about 25 per cent. The number of men affected, including engine drivers, blacksmiths, quarrymen and laborers.

AN AGRICULTURAL PICNIC PLANNED

It will be held in St. Stephen, on grounds near Dominion Fertilizer Plant, on May 3rd.

St. Stephen, April 22.—An agricultural picnic will be held in St. Stephen on the grounds not far from the factory of the Dominion Fertilizer Co., Ltd. If the weather should be unfavorable the lectures will be delivered in a hall in St. Stephen.

A number of speakers will be present including: J. B. Daggott, secretary for agriculture; Andrew Elliott, seeds and soil specialist; A. B. Durost, B. S. A., fertilizer, drainage and bees; Miss Daisy Harrison, formerly superintendent Women's Institutes for New Brunswick.

Mr. Elliott will discuss in detail the growing of crops for and the methods of conducting field crops competitions. A number of these competitions are to be carried on in the County of Carlton the coming season, under the auspices of the various agricultural societies.

Mr. Durost will discuss fertilizers from the farmer's point of view. Speakers from the Dominion Fertilizer Company and others will discuss the matter from the manufacturer's side.

The Dominion Fertilizer Company's factory will be open for inspection, and arrangements have been made with the manager to have men, well acquainted with the manufacture and mixing of fertilizers, who will, following the lecture, show parties through the factory.

The factory will be in full operation and every opportunity will be given to see fertilizers in all stages of preparation. The nature and use of the various raw materials, which may be seen there in large quantities, will be carefully explained. This will be an opportunity which no farmer can well afford to miss—to see what is being put into the mixed fertilizers that he is using on his land.

While the men are seeing the factory, Miss Harrison will address the ladies on some subject of interest to them.

Sandwiches, cake, tea and coffee will be served free on the grounds. The committee will not be offended if the ladies prefer to carry this bill of fare by bringing baskets.

WITH THE DRIVES IN THE MIRAMICHI

Chatham, April 22.—On the Miramichi the stream driving crews are being sent to the headwaters to commence work. A report from Doaktown this morning said that the river was clear of ice and that some drivers left yesterday and others were going today.

Business reported a heavy shower this morning and that stream driving had started on Trout Brook and Taxis this morning said that all the lumber and men are being sent to the head of the river to start work on the main river drive on Monday.

On the Northwest branch the ice is still holding down to the railway bridge. Below that is open, and the Sinclair lumber mill at the bridge had steam up yesterday.

DRIVES IN RIVER MAY BE HUNG UP

Fredericton, April 22.—The expected trouble in getting out the drives in central portion of the province is developing and it now looks as if many of the drives in that part of the country would be tied up. R. B. Smith, of Oromocto cut about eight million feet of logs on the Oromocto and on Little River, Sunbury county, and it is said today that all the lumber that he has been successful in bringing out will not amount to more than one million feet. The drive on the Oromocto has been hung up, one drive on the Little River is also hung up, while an effort is being made to drag out the other drive on Little River. The water in the St. John river here has come up steadily during the past couple of days, but is not rising rapidly today.

DEATH OF AGED RESIDENT OF FREDERICTON.

Fredericton, April 22.—The death occurred last night at the ripe old age of 90 years of Michael O'Leary, for many years an employe of the water department of this city.

LUMBER MILLS MAKING READY FOR SEASON'S WORK

(Chatham Gazette.) The Mulholland or lower roasting mill of the Miramichi Lumber Co. will start work in a few days and will run at full capacity all season, with night and day crews at work from probably the middle of May onwards. The upper roasting mill at Morrison's Cove will be started this year the first in several seasons and will be run to full capacity of its fifteen machines from the first part of May. The big mill at Doaktown is now ready for its start and will run at night probably two or three months. It will also be worked to its full capacity in the three departments, sawing, shingles and laths.

The Miramichi Lumber Co. will have an exceptionally busy season with the Miramichi in operation and it is estimated that the amounts that this company will pay out during the season in wages alone in these mills will reach the big total of \$125,000.

The first streamer that the company expects to arrive here is the Agout which sailed from Liverpool for Chatham on the second of the month, and is due here any day. The next will be the Apennine.

Mr. Durost on the river are expected to open about the usual time, though bad driving conditions may delay matters somewhat at the start.

On the whole the Miramichi may look forward to an active season in the lumber business and as the starting of the mills means giving employment to upwards of 2,500 men, the importance of this industry to the people who live along the banks of this river may easily be judged.
