

## FARM MACHINERY IS URGENTLY NEEDED IF FRANCE IS TO MAKE OCCUPIED REGIONS PRODUCTIVE

Government is Doing Everything Possible to Restore People to Land, But Horses and Oxen and Agricultural Implements Are Not to be Had.

Paris, Jan. 19.—The European edition of the Herald, in publishing the fifth of a series of articles on French devastation, explains what is being done to enable the land holder to re-establish himself after having suffered from German barbarity and describes the difficulties facing the farmers in the provinces of the Marne, Meuse and Moselle. There has been some permanent reconstruction by private contractors working under the direction of local engineers, some public works and a number of farm buildings in the region of Meaux and Chateau-Thierry have been built and repairs have been made to several towns and villages near the front.

In twelve or fifteen farming villages south of Chalons-sur-Marne and around Vitry-le-François the government has organized co-operative societies for reconstruction. In each case they have received the maximum advance on the eventual indemnity for their losses which allowed them to re-build one-quarter of their necessary buildings. The technical service of reconstruction has placed orders with private contractors throughout France for about 25,000 demountable wooden houses with two rooms and a shed, costing from \$700 to \$1,000 each and for 10,000 demountable wooden farm buildings to cost \$150 to \$300.

With regard to furniture, an indemnity law is about to be voted which provides for the paying of damages for furniture loss up to \$3,000, under a decree issued by the Minister of Liberated Regions, November 2, 1918.

## TRYING TO DECIDE GERMANY'S STATUS

The Admission of Germany to League of Nations Subject of Much Discussion.

Paris, Friday, Jan. 17.—The admission of Germany to the league of nations is the subject of considerable discussion in peace conference circles. While they are as yet academic some interesting views have been developed. In the opinion of Leon Bourgeois, the French authority on the league of nations, the league for the present must be composed exclusively of the associated nations and those neutral states which, since 1917, have adhered to the rules of the second Hague peace conference, and who have during the war strictly obeyed the obligations of international rights.

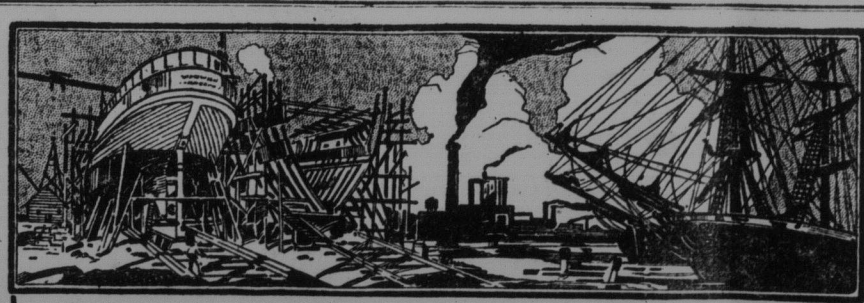

## ITALIAN CABINET IS REORGANIZED

Resignation of Former Cabinet Accepted by King Victor Emmanuel and New One Reconstructed.

Rome, Jan. 19.—An official note issued today says: "Since the conclusion of the armistice and following a discussion in the Chamber and the vote on credits, the ministers have thought it well to place their portfolio at the disposal of the Premier for re-organization of the cabinet. The events which followed, and the absence of Premier Orlando, delayed the plan, which was taken up at a cabinet meeting held last Wednesday."

"King Victor Emmanuel accepted the resignations of Signor Sacchi, Minister of Justice, Minister Nitti, of the Treasury; Signor Mitani, Minister of Agriculture, and Signor Villa, Minister of Transport. He has designated Signor Facta, former Minister of Finance to be Minister of Justice; Signor Strimling to be Minister of the Treasury; General Cavaglia as Minister of War; General Gradi to be Minister of Pensions; Signor Rocco, former Minister of Posts and Telegraphs, to be Minister of Agriculture; and Signor de Nava, a member of the Roselli ministry, to be Minister of Transport."
